THE TWENTY-SECOND.—"On Friday last," says the Lancaster Union, "the Lancaster Fencibles, Captain Franklin; Jones Artillery, Safe Harbor, Captain Hess; Washington Rifles, Mount Joy, Captain Waltman; Maytown Infantry, Captain Haines; American and Union Fire companies of this city under the Marshalships of Col. S. H. Price and Chas. A. Heinisch, Esq., visited Harrisburg, and participated in the celebration of Washington's birth-day and witnessed the raising of the American flag from the dome of the Capitol. All these companies elicited the warmest encomiums, from the immense concourse of people present at the State Capitol on that occasion, for the fine appearance they made; and especially in this remark applicable to the Fencibles. They were greatly admired. But the chief attraction was the music discoursed by the Band connected with the company.—They were selected, we understand, to play the national airs when the flag was raised. A high compliment, when the fact is considered that there were a number of excellent Bands on the spot from our Lancaster county friends who participated in the celebration of the birth-day of the Father of his Country at Harrisburg."

A committee has been appointed to receive Mr. Buchanan, on his arrival at Lancaster, on Tuesday or Wednesday next. Invitations to participate have been extended to all the civic and military associations in the County.

We were in error in stating last week on the authority of a contemporary, that Gen. Cass would accompany Mr. Buchanan. Despatches in the city papers of Monday state that he was to leave Washington on Tuesday last for his home in Michigan, accompanied by a widowed daughter. Our people, therefore, will not have an opportunity of seeing the aged statesman.

The Marietta Literary Society adjourned on Monday evening last to meet on Thursday evening of next week. The change is owing to the expected visit of the County Superintendent of Common Schools, who will hold an evening session. The Society will discuss the following question—Should parents give their daughters as full and complete an education as their sons? Affirmative, Messrs. Sawyer, Spangler, Hiestand, Clark and Lindsay. Negative, Messrs. Geist, Cassel, Dr. Grove, Congdon and Ettla. Messrs. Sanders and Girod's Sitting Band is expected.

The Lancaster Evening Express says Hon. Thomas E. Franklin has returned to his home, in that city, from the Peace Congress, and received the congratulations of Union men of all parties, on the adoption of his proposition and the successful termination of the labors of the Conference.

Mr. Nathan Dyer, late of the firm of Plumb and Dyer, has succeeded from the late firm, and "goes it on his own hook," in the room adjoining Mr. Nichols Chapman's residence and immediately opposite Mr. Alexander Lyndsay's boot and shoe store, market street.

The Maytown Infantry was present at the Flag raising pageant in Harrisburg, and looked remarkably fine. They did not return until Saturday afternoon when they paraded through a couple of our streets and returned home. They are a credit to their village.

The Baltimore City Guards battalion design showing their respect for President Buchanan, on his retrifary from office, by giving him an escort with full ranks to his home in Lancaster.

It is said, with one or two exceptions, the members of the Pennsylvania legislature signed the pardoning petition of Judge Vandersmith. It is thought he certainly will be pardoned.

The Legislature adjourned yesterday until the middle of next week, to afford members an opportunity of visiting Washington and witnessing the ceremonies incident to the inauguration of President Lincoln.

On Thursday, the Senate passed the bill commuting the tonnage tax on the Pennsylvania R. R. by a vote of 18 to 15. The Subury and Erie R. R. bill, also passed finally by a vote of 25 to 8.

If I have intruded on your patience and mortified my friends, I beg their pardon; I will "secede"—tho' I am not a secessionist. I love the land of my birth, for which my fore-fathers fought too well. I find "true" friends a priceless and rare article. "Like angle's visits—few and far between." In climbing up a craggy eminence, many a miss step we make; much to our annoyance, but it is the part of wisdom to continue climbing by seeking a surer foothold, and leaving quickly the precarious one. And so we maintain our footing in life; we take step by step, as one gives way, we more cautiously try another; learning wisdom from every incautious step. And with the poet we ever find that "Trembling at every step he takes, Man yet mistakes his way."

I trust my literary friends will keep on climbing—tho' it be to the mortification of "friends," and the pleasure of enemies. If you stop, and let yourself go down, the world will shout and wave the triumphal flag of victory. You may find a sure foothold by changing your position, or wearing to another point. "Don't give up the ship."

DR. CAMERON'S LECTURES: The discourses delivered last week in the Temperance Hall, by Dr. John Cameron, Hydrophatic Physician, of Columbia, were able and interesting. The Doctor has a pleasant conversational style of delivery, and so simplifies his subject matter, as to suit it to the comprehension of all his hearers. The subjects were: Vegetarianism, and Water Cure. In the former he explained the health promoting results of plain uncondensed food—the superiority of a fruit and vegetable diet, over any animal substances in affording mankind the highest and best mental and bodily conditions; as illustrative of this view he cited the robust and enduring physical powers of his countrymen, (the Scotch peasantry) who subsist chiefly on oat meal, many of whom eat meat only during the Christmas festivities; they, the lecturer thought, would compare favorably in their physique with the meat eaters of any country. The curative agencies of his system, pure air, wholesome diet, and water judiciously applied, he maintained, were the best the world affords to restore normal bodily conditions; he explained the mode of treating eruptive diseases, such as Scarlet Fever, and also paid a merited compliment to Dr. R. T. Trall, principal professor of the New-York Hydrophatic College, whose prolific pen has furnished mankind with more scientific truths on human life powers—sources of health—causes of disease, and the best means of preventing disease, and restoring health, than any other living man on the Continent. His various works now widely spread over the land, will cause him in after years to be recognized as having been one of the first philanthropists of his age. It is much to be regretted that the fact of Dr. Cameron being about to lecture here was not more generally known, as many who were not apprised of it, were anxious to give him a hearing.

The Pennsylvania Railroad Company are about to remove their shops from Parkersburg to Harrisburg. The Company already has extensive shops at the latter place. We learn that some of the workmen at Parkersburg have made arrangements for removing to Harrisburg in the Spring with their families.

The appointment of Samuel J. Jones, M. D., of Bainbridge, Lancaster County, Pa., as an Assistant Surgeon in the United States Navy, has recently been confirmed, and his commission will be made out immediately.

Hiram B. Swarr, who was appointed by President Pierce, Postmaster of Lancaster, in place of Henry M. Reigart, deceased, has just been re-appointed by President Lincoln. Of course his new appointment will be short-lived.

J. Franklin Reigart, of this Lancaster city, has been appointed Assistant Examiner in the U. S. Patent office. We presume the Colonel's stay will be short.


