PARKESBURG SHOPS: The Pennsylvania Railroad Company is now engaged taking down the machinery in the shops at Parkesburg, preparatory to removal to Harrisburg. The ground on which the shops are erected was originally presented to the State by George Parke, to hold as long as long as it should be occupied for the repair of locomotives, &c. and when abandoned for such purpose, to revert to the original owner or his heirs. When the State sold the Railroad to the Pennsylvania Company, the shops passed into their hands.
