READING AND COLUMBIA RAILROAD. We learn that ground has been broken on this road, which is to be completed and ready for travel on the 4th of July, 1862. The main line will run directly to Columbia, and connect with the York and Wrightsville Railroad. A branch road six miles in length will be built to the city of Lancaster. At Ephrata the line will form a junction with the Downingtown and Waynesboro' Railroad, and at Manheim with the Cornwall road .-The Reading and Columbia Railroad will thus form a very important trunk line through Berks and Lancaster counties, and will furnish coal to a population of two hundred thousand people. The Cornwall branch will carry the primitive ores from the mines for all the furnaces at Columbia and Marietta. The main line will pass through the Chestaut Hill ore mines, where the cold short ores lie in a basin one hundred feet thick. There is probably no portion of the country where the population is denser or the local traffic will be greater than over the country traversed by this new railroad.
