

'Eagle's Nest' is the House of The Month

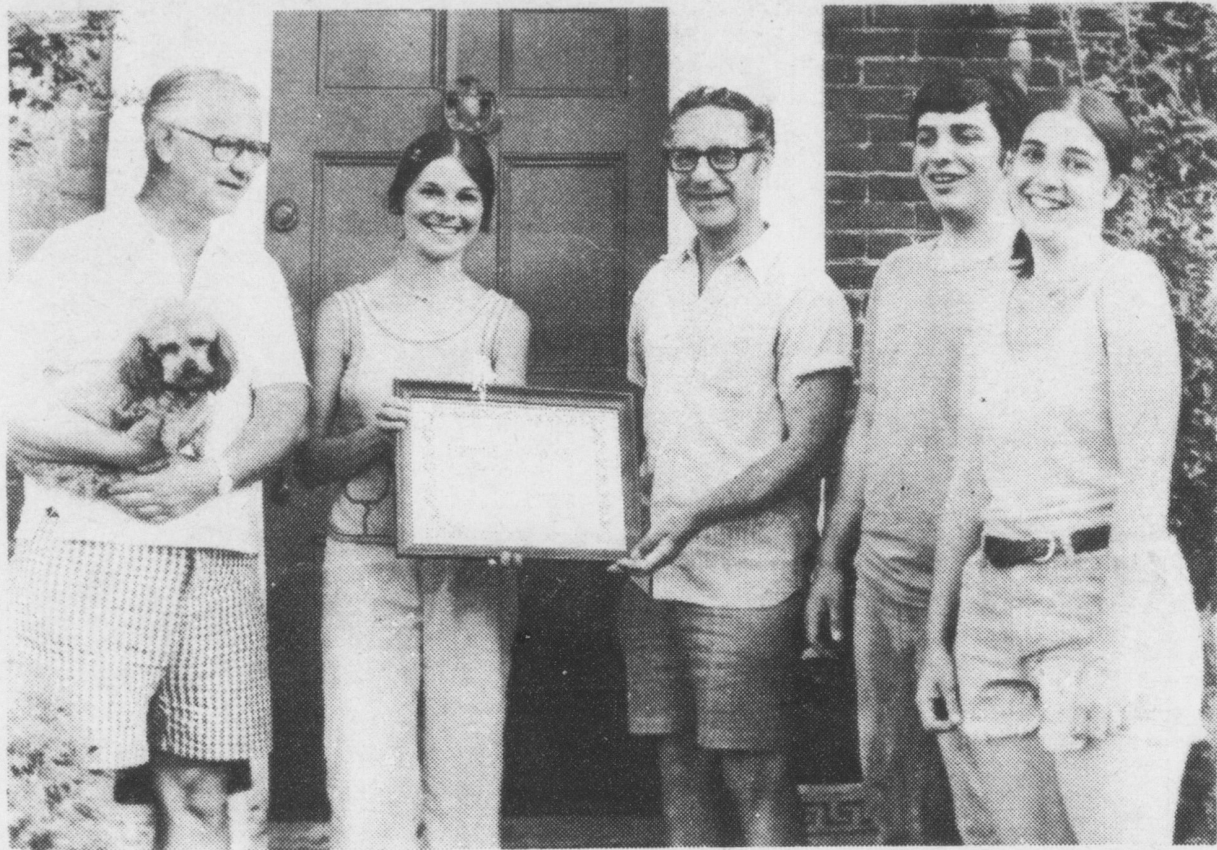

"The Eagle's Nest", 217 East Market Street, Marietta, has been chosen as "House of the Month" for the month of June.

The "House of the Month" award is a recognition the Marietta Restoration Associates have been awarding to people whose exemplary efforts in restoration and preservation have been an asset to the community.

A combination residence - business for the owners Joseph H. Libhart and

Thomas S. Vicidomini, "The Eagle's Nest" has been restored as an early 19th century townhouse.

The two men moved into the house eight years ago when Mr. Vicidomini took over the rearing of his nephew and niece, Patrick and Nanette Pinto.

With the special help of Patrick who gained his carpentry knowhow at Vo-tech school, these four residents have done most of the restoration work themselves and still have many improvements planned for the property.

A special feature of the home is a beautifully landscaped terrace and rose garden which was recently featured in Marietta's Garden Tour.

The owners restore paintings, handblown glass porcelain, and other objects d'art. When Mr. Libhart moved his business from New York he was surprised to find a large amount of local business which he handles in the basement - workshop of the house.

The fine effort that has been put into "The Eagle's Nest" is another example of how Marietta residents are upgrading the community with a special combination; a respect for and knowledge of past architecture and the enthusiasm and perseverance necessary to carry out the work that needs to be done.

Theater: Cynthia Charles and Paul Smith.

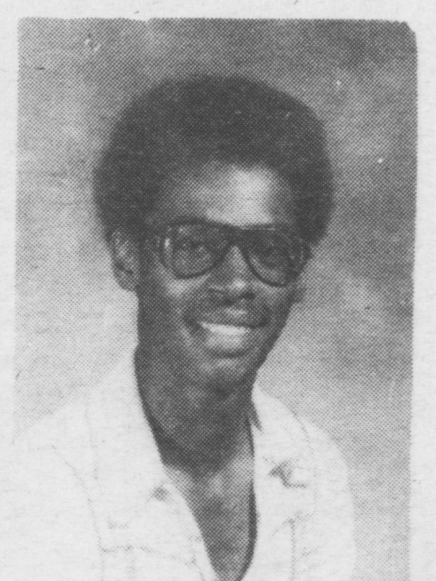
Music: Mary Kanoff, alternate.

The Intermediate Unit, office of Special Education Services, is responsible for their costs at the School, which amounts to roughly a \$1000.00 scholarship for each student.

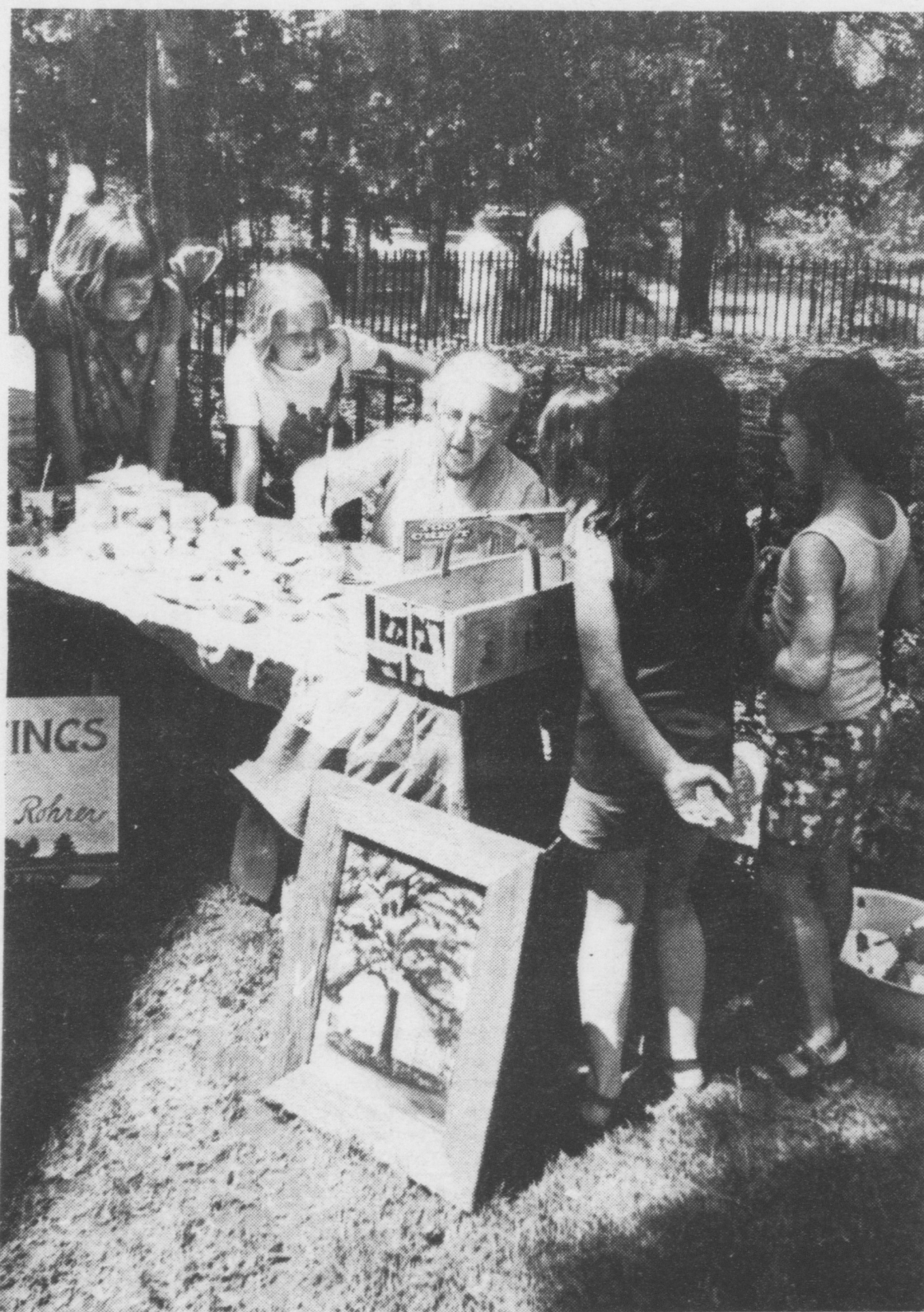
