Larry Warfel, an Emergency Medical Technician who responds to ambulance calls, said that CPR is used in about 40% of all emergencies he deals with.

The trouble is, CPR should be started immediately. A person is often dead by the time the ambulance arrives. "The more people who know CPR, the more lives will be saved," Larry told us.

The course started with a 30 minute film which explained basic CPR. Follow-

The course was organiz-

ed by Mike Kanoff. Manikins and booklets were supplied by the Red Cross, and Steve and Dan volunteered their time.

The division chairpersons McMurtrie said, are spending their time now through the campaign (Sept. 7 -Nov. 18) in four major

areas of responsibility: management, recruitment, and training, organization and planning and followup.

"As a manager," he said, "the division chairperson must be the primary motivator and decisionmaker for those under him in the hierarchy. As a recruiter and trainer, he is responsible for bringing his volunteer campaign workers on board, some halfdozen section chairpersons in each division, and seeing that they understand their responsibilities."

Section chairpersons are responsible for a group of related firms within the trade group division, such as Retailers and Wholesalers, Utilities Communications in the Commerce and Transportation Division McMurtrie said. He added that the section chairpersons are in turn responsible for recruiting and training as many as 15 volunteer account executives who will contact with every business or firm in the county to set-up in-house campaigns.

Finally, he said, the division chairpersons will follow-up on each account until the drive is completed in late November.

Over all, there are some 5,000 volunteers in United Way's campaign structure, including a solicitor for every 10 employees.

"The chief advantages of organization this approach," McMurtrie said "are that it is efficient and extremely inexpensive. By relying entirely on volunteers, the only expense we incur is for supplies. As a result, United Way's nominal fund-raising cost of 5.2% of the total campaign receipts is the lowest in the nation.

"We are counting on our organization this year to be instrumental in reaching the ambitious \$2.1 million goal we've set, which is absolutely critical to the survival of our 38 human
