


Players, coaches honored at MYO picnic

PEOPLE SAY THE SWEETEST THINGS TO STEAL YOUR MONEY.

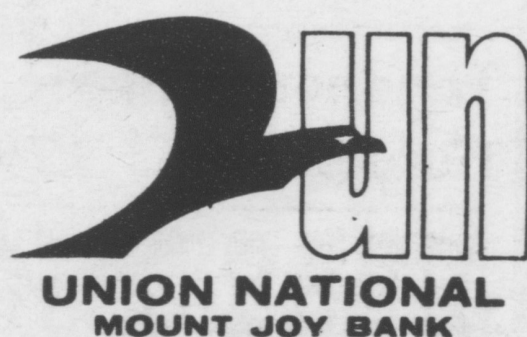


Some people make a living talking other people out of their money. They're sweet talkers. They're very good at it. And they could be anybody.
