Raise funds to install DHS lights

Funds are already being raised for Project D-Lites, the plan to install lights on the DHS athletic fields.

The Donegal Adults Booster Club hopes to raise \$12,000 for lights in the next few weeks.

Only private funds will be used to finance the project. The cost of operating the lights will be about \$10 per hour.

Night games generally attract more fans than afternoon contests. Since admission to a football game costs \$1.50, the lights will probably pay more than the cost of operating them.

At a meeting following the football game at Donegal High School Saturday, September 25, 1976, the Donegal Adult Athletic Booster Organization set plans for lighting the athletic complex.

Edgar Jones, president of the football booster club, outlined plans and called on the booster members present for support. Thirty adults were present, and positive plans were formulated.

Mrs. Vivian Carroll will serve as secretary-treasurer of the organization. Mr. Ben Gainer will assist Mr. Edgar Jones in planning

and coordinating the work force. Mr. Steve Banks is the vice-president for the organization.

Plans currently call for fund raising projects that will include solicitation of local industry, business, and other friends of Donegal's athletic program. Mrs. Carroll indicated other funding projects would include hoagie sales, auctions, and raffles. Parents of the athletes are asked to contact Mrs. Carroll, 426-1270 to get their names on the funding project task force.

At that session, the school board will probably present a two-year contract offer to the teachers' union.

The teachers have already rejected the board's final one-year contract offer. The teachers also

authorized their negotiators to call a strike "whenever necessary."
