College sends kids off campus

Elizabethtown College is developing a Cooperative Education program to place students off-campus in meaningful work experiences while they're going to school.

The college has received a federal grant of \$14,000 from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare to plan and implement the program.

It has appointed James R. Hilton, the director of career planning and placement, to direct it.

Hilton, who has been working halftime on the project since September, says the College hopes to place students in practical situations in industry, business, government, and other service-oriented professions.

The long-range objective is to apply Coop Education to all disciplines, including the humanities, he said.

According to Hilton, students participating in the program are expected to receive academic credit for the experience, the actual amount up to individual academic departments. They also are expected to receive salaries from employers.

Hilton, who has begun making calls on area business and industry to develop placements, says Coop Ed can be a boon to outside organizations.

It allows them to experiment with new positions or to undertake short-range projects without making long-range employment commitments; it frees higher-level employees for more specialized and demanding work; it can help them financially by reducing recruiting costs and

turnover at the entry level positions, by keeping student personnel in entry-level jobs at entry-level salaries; by saving on fringe benefits; and by allowing the company access to specialized skill training.

Studies indicate that stu-

dents returning from Coop experiences appear to do better in classroom, do better in job interviews, and to receive higher salaries in their first jobs.

Helping Hilton plan and implement the program is a committee of faculty, students and administrators.

This new one-man portrait is a haunting characterization gleaned from the writings, criticisms, and letter of the author, such as "The Raven" and "Annable Lee".



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


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
