She was a member of St. Paul's United Methodist Church, Elizabethtown.

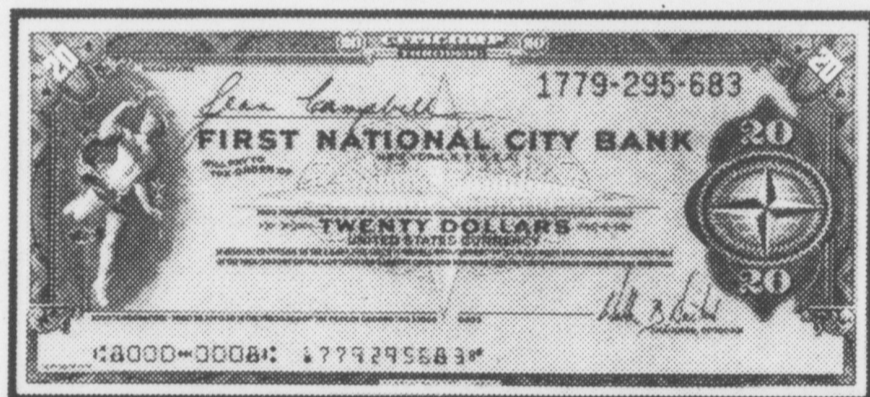

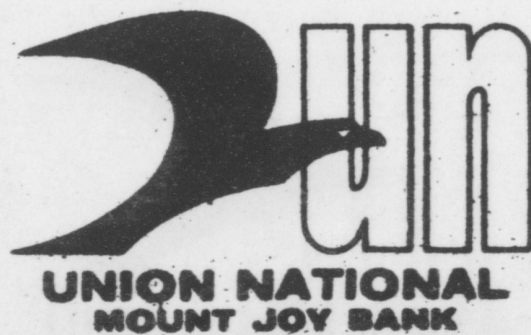
