Odd coach Rick Breault told the Times that there are 32 alumni on both teams, most of whom will play only offense or only defense. There are also 22 alumni cheerleaders.

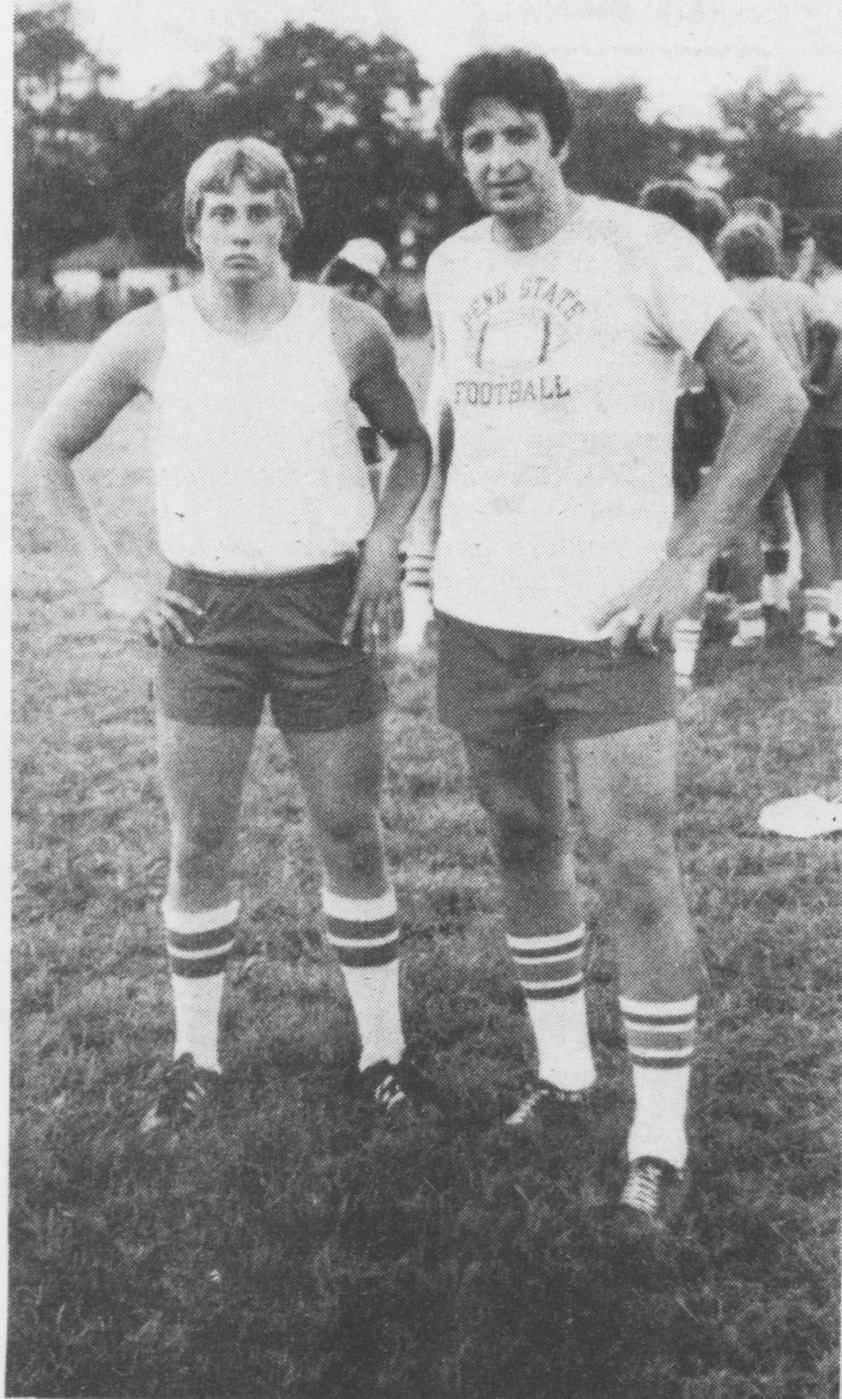
Most of the alumni are in their late twenties and early thirties. The youngest ones are last year's grads, and the oldest is 38.

One alumnus, John Stehman, commutes to the DHS practices from Halifax in

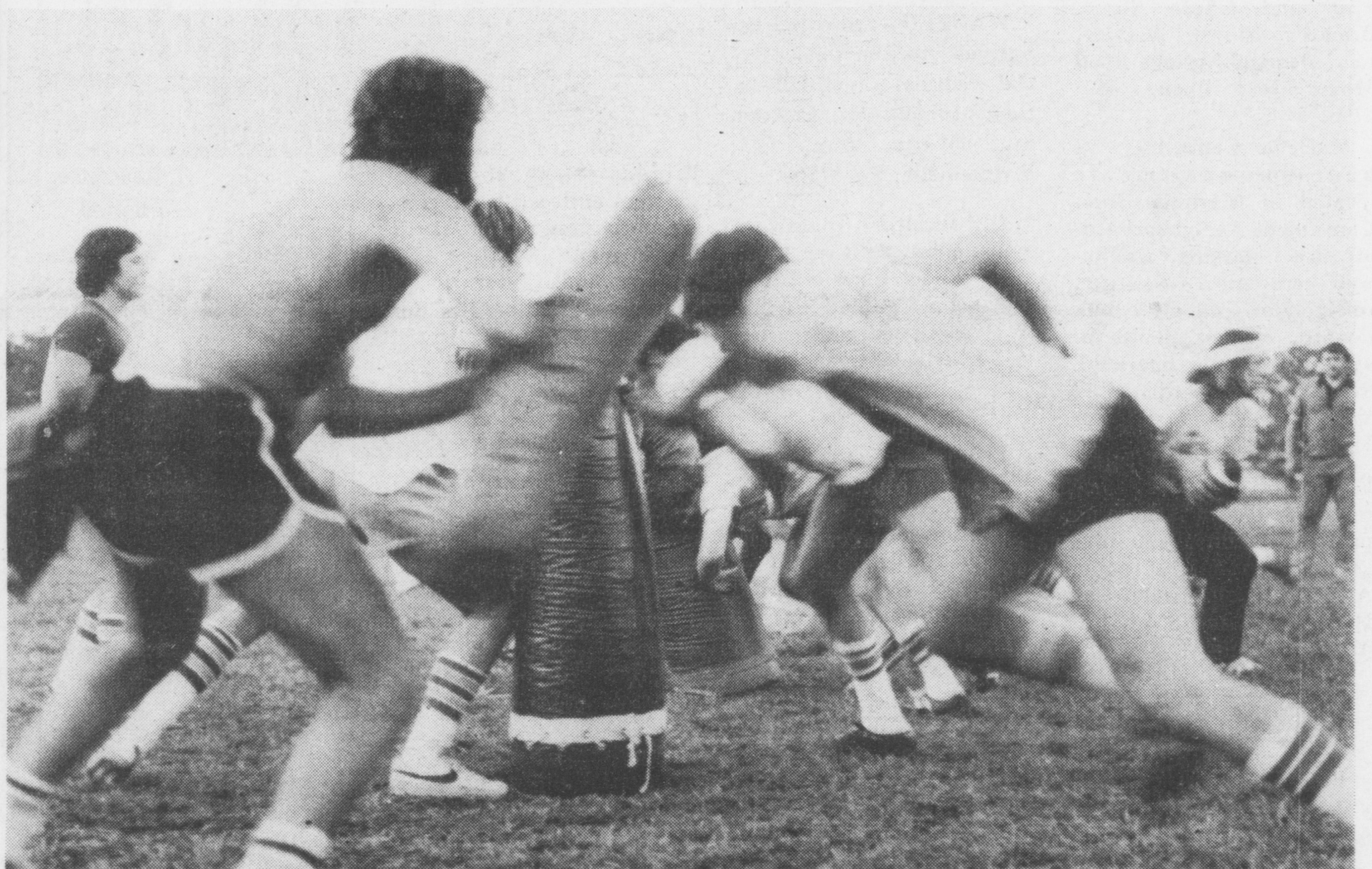
York County, about an hour and one-half's drive away.
