\$200 per month for their services.

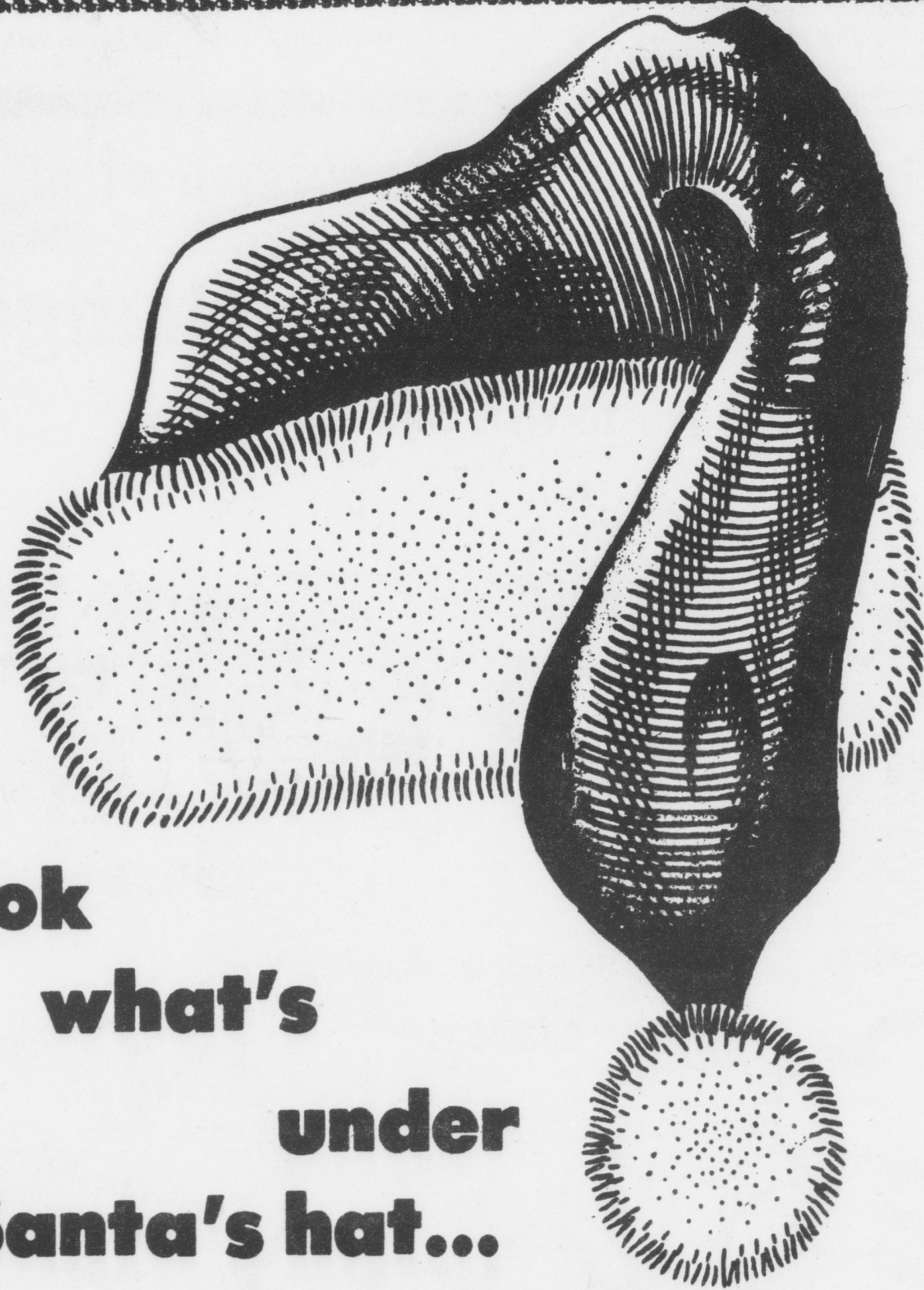

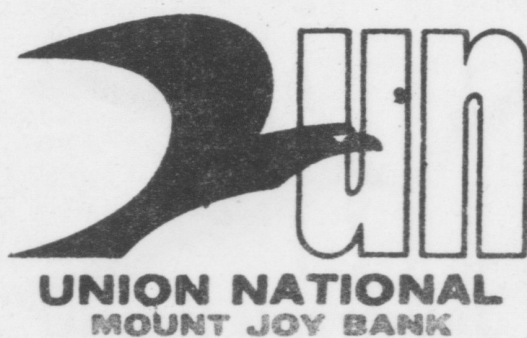

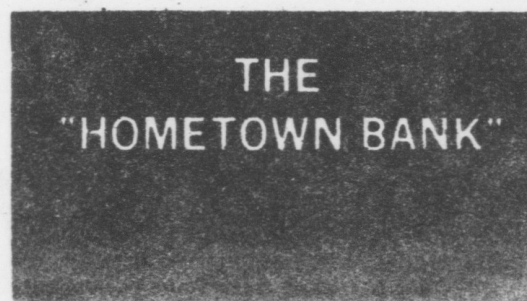

It's most interesting to watch the evolution of the candidates.
