repaired them. The street committee asked the ordinance committee to look into the matter and clean up any ambiguities in the present law. The committee will probably make a recommendation to Council at the next meeting.

30 residents of No. Chestnut Street asked Council to do something about the traffic on their street. They complained that the street is too narrow to be two-way.

Council decided to eliminate parking on one side of North Chestnut Street, instead of changing it to a one-way street.

The Marietta Jaycees were given the go-ahead on their revisions to the electric lines in Memorial Park. The MYAA was permitted to fix a drainage problem at the baseball diamond.

It was decided to close East Walnut Street for dancing from 6:00 to 10:00 PM from June 29th through July 3rd, in conjunction with the Jaycee 4th of July celebration.

Ralph Shope was appointed housing officer.
