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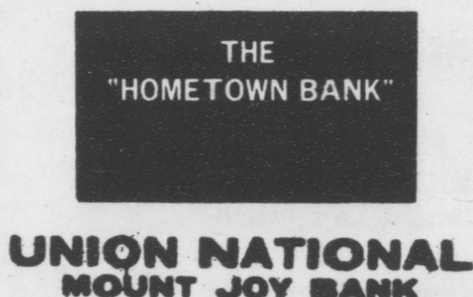

Timely tips

Did you know that black and white pepper come from the same berry? It's true! Both come from the berry of a climbing vine. When the grower wants a black pepper he picks the berries slightly underripe and simply dries them. When the product is to be white pepper, the berries are left to mature fully. The outer husks are then removed by soaking and rubbing and the light colored kernels alone are dried. You can see the difference clearly if you slice a black peppercorn in

half. There'll be a noticeable difference between the dark outer shell and the light kernel.

Black pepper is by far the most popular. It has more fragrance, because the husk is highly aromatic. White pepper, on the other hand, is ideal in light colored foods where dark specks might not be attractive. Pepper is, of course, our "master spice," good in just about any food you can mention... even in some desserts. Believe it or not, a bit of black pepper is mysteriously good with the sweet spices in spice cake, pumpkin pie and similar baked goods.
