Mrs. Kilgers, of York County, said that bell collectors have more fun because they make more noise. She then spoke of the materials bells are made from: wood, brass, silver, glass, china and other ceramics, and even paper mache. Some bells don't even have clappers, she said.

Bells, which have been rung for a long time, are mentioned in the Bible and

are found in some ancient tombs. In olden times families had their distinctively tuned bells.

Bells are used as alarms, as time signals, and as animal finders (cows and sheep, turkeys and camels have been located by bells). Sleigh bells were used purely for their musical qualities.

Mrs. Kilger's personal bell collection started with the bell her kindergarten teacher used to call the class to order. She has found bells for her collection in many corners of the world since.
