Poisonous snakes guard jewels

Snakes aren't just nasty little slimy things that bite people. They are also very beneficial to man.

First of all, snakes are the farmer's friend (and so all of our's) because they

eat lots of rodents, insects, and other pests. Snakes are part of the balance of nature.

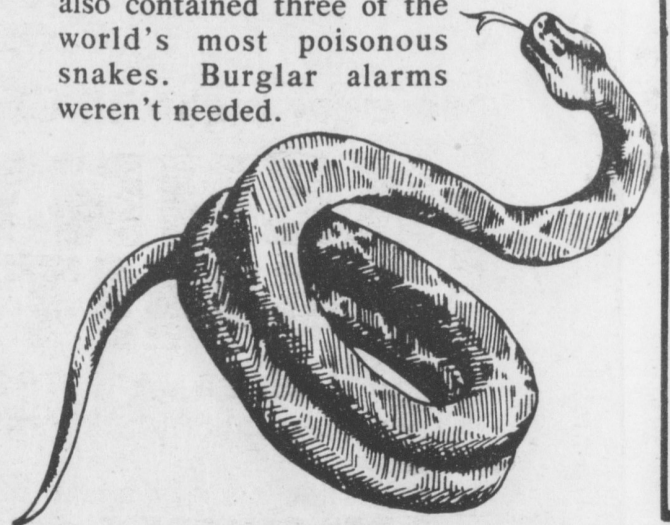
Secondly, the very snake venoms that sometimes kill people are being used by

scientists to make drugs. Cobroxin, an enzyme taken from cobra venom, is turned into a powerful pain killer for patients suffering from arthritis, cancer and leprosy.

Other venoms are used to treat hemophilia and to dissolve blood clots that cause strokes and heart attacks.

About 210 species of snakes are venomous. The others, numbering about 2,400 species, don't produce poisonous and useful secretions, but they sometimes find other uses. A gas station owner in Virginia keeps a 6-foot boa constrictor in his garage after hours. He has never been robbed.

At a jewel exhibit in Sweden, a case containing \$429,000 worth of gems also contained three of the world's most poisonous snakes. Burglar alarms weren't needed.
