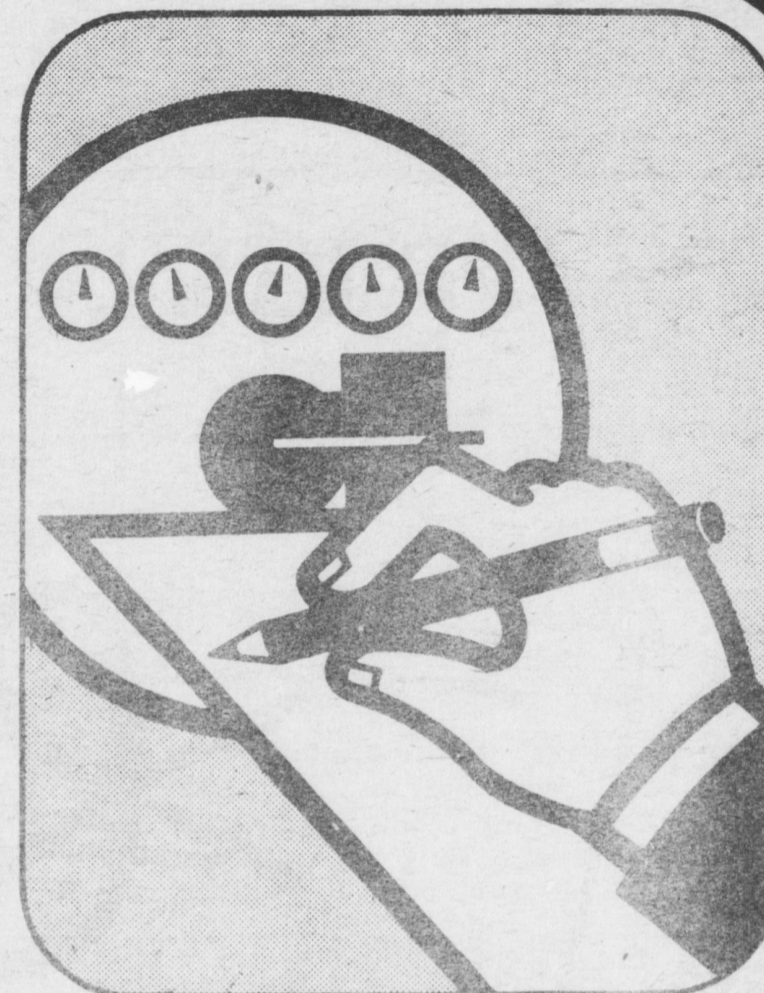

Monthly billing Monthly meter reading

starting January 1979

The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission has directed PP&L and other major electric utilities in the state to bill all residential customers monthly.

Therefore, starting in January, PP&L customers who have been billed every two months, will be billed once a month. For most residential customers with electric heat, monthly billing has been the practice and will simply continue.

In addition, PP&L has decided to read electric meters monthly instead of every other month. This means that unless unforeseen emergencies occur, such as severe weather conditions, monthly bills will always be based on actual meter readings. Even though this change is not a PUC requirement, PP&L believes it will be an additional convenience to customers.
