## Record deer killed by autos

Last year 28,274 whitetail deer were killed by trucks and autos in the commonwealth. That is the second highest number on record. The most deer were run over in 1975, when 29,914 were removed from the roads by the Game Commission.

More deer are killed by vehicles in Pennsylvania

than are killed by hunters in 35 other states, according to these figures, which are lower than the real total—some deer hits are not reported.

The county with the most deer killed was, appropriately enough, Bucks county with 1,296.

2,544 deer were killed by dogs last year.

## Ted Hershey will dance here this weekend

This Sunday, March 4th, the Princeton Ballet, of Princeton, NJ, will perform at the DHS auditorium, sponsored by People United for the Arts.

Among the dancers will be Ted Hershey, a Mount Joy native and Donegal graduate. Ted, now under a resident professional contract with the Princeton Ballet, is the son of Mrs. Amos Hershey, the president of People United for the Arts.

The critically-acclaimed Princeton Ballet was recently named a "major company" by the National Association for Regional Ballet, making it one of the

top eight regional dance companies from a group of 118 in the U.S. and Canada.
