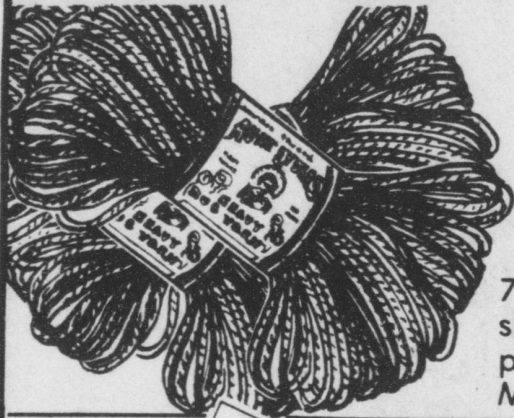

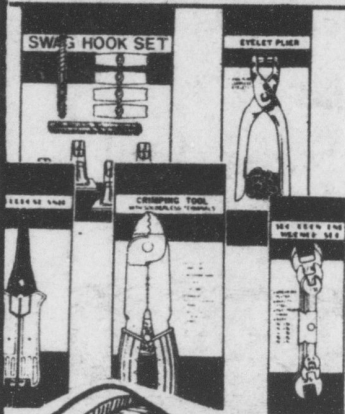

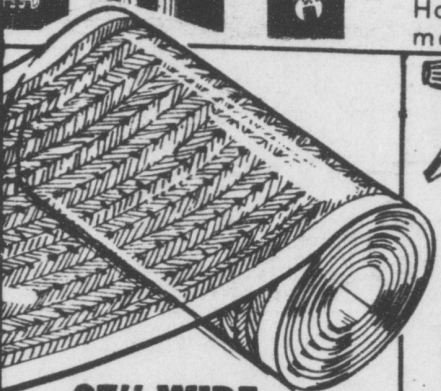

Brownie Troop 323 entertained its sister troop, #55 Juniors, for "Thinking Day," held Thursday at Gloss Brenner U.M. Church in Mount Joy. Thinking Day is observed by Girl Scouts all over the planet every year on February 22nd, the birthday of Lord Baden-Powell, founder of scouting. Baden-Powell's wife got the idea for the girl scouts.

Three members of the cadette and senior troops spoke to the gathering about scouting in the countries they grew up in—Canada, Germany and Thailand.

Mrs. Ruby Houck, from Labrador, told the girls about Canada's political and social life. She said that, in Labrador, people always take their shoes off before entering a house. She passed around a pair

of tiny sealskin mukluks (boots).

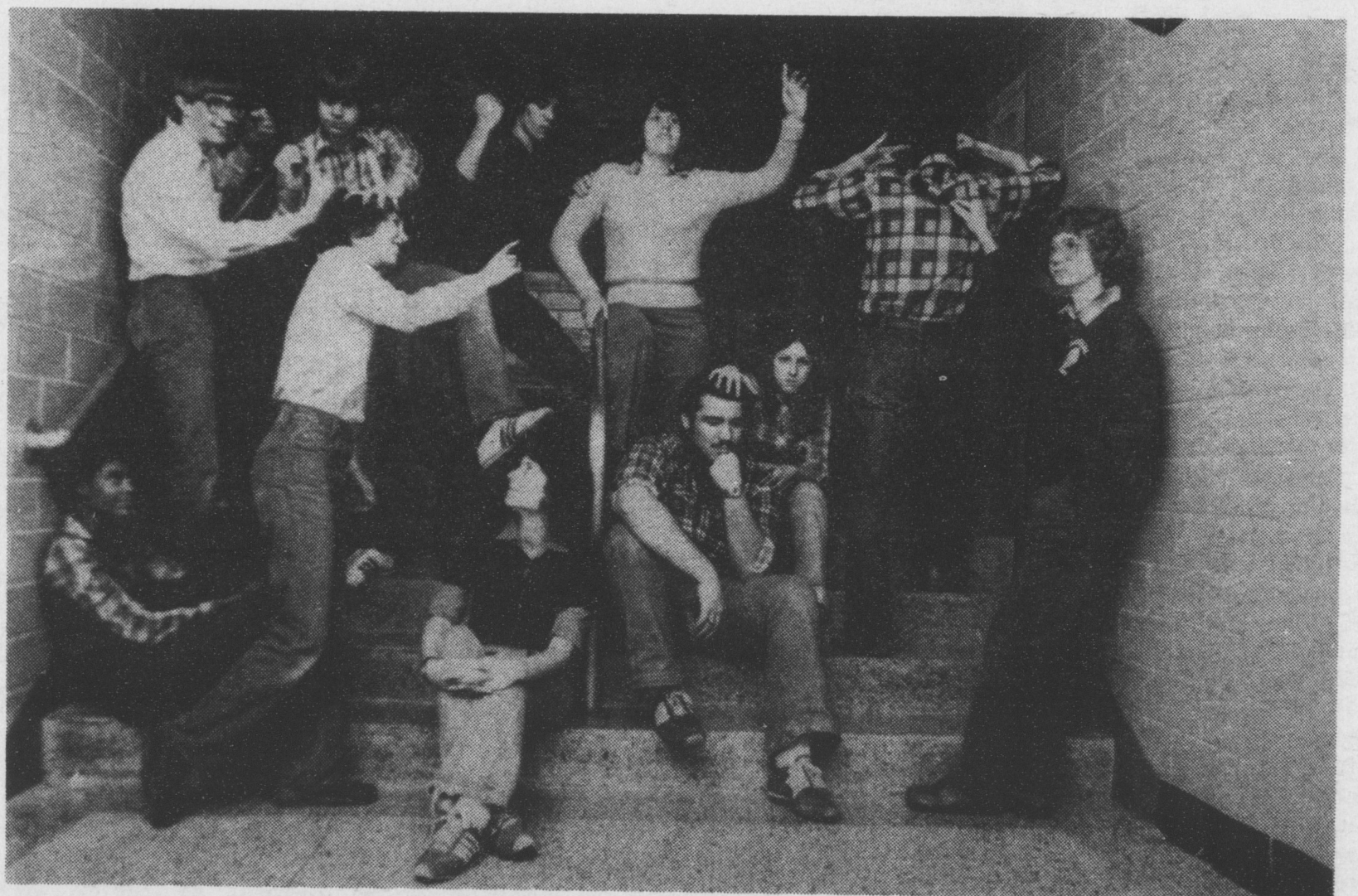
