### Watch out when flying kites

Many young people (and some older ones) like to fly kites during the warm months now beginning. Here are some tips about safe kiting:

- never fly kites or model airplanes near electric lines;
- don't use metal wire for a kite string or fly a kite in the rain. You or your child may be electrocuted by doing this.

Everyone knows that Ben Franklin flew a kite in the rain to prove that lightning is electrical. But most people don't know that Franklin wasn't standing in the rain when he did it. Ben stood inside a shed door so that he would not be holding a wet string when the lightning struck the kite.

Franklin was the first man to succeed with this experiment because he was the first to survive it. A Russian man tried the same thing two weeks before Franklin's experiment and died.

Incidentally, kites that contain metal frames or cloths are also unsafe, as they attract electricity.

## Township Supervisors

A contract for \$27,776 to complete a kitchen, restrooms and playground equipment was awarded to Bob Smith, Contractor, at the April session of the East Donegal Township Supervisors Thursday night. A similar contract for \$15,576 was given to the same bidder for two tennis courts, all to be installed in the park adjoining the municipal building of East Donegal Township. The contract states the completion date as 120 days from April 12.

Nine building permits were granted. 13 emergency fire calls were reported for

the month.

Jack Doutrich, Ambulance Crew Chief, outlined the plan set up by the Civil Defense and Fire Chief for evacuation during the recent TMI weekend. Doutrich reported 17 ambulance calls for the month of March.

In other business, the supervisors decided to have the tennis courts at Legion Park sealed as soon as possible; make repairs to the existing backstop; install bike racks; and rent 2 Jiffy Johns for each park. Two dusk-to-dawn lights will be installed at the firehouse.
