

# Marietta Jaycees' Easter Egg Hunt enjoyed by all



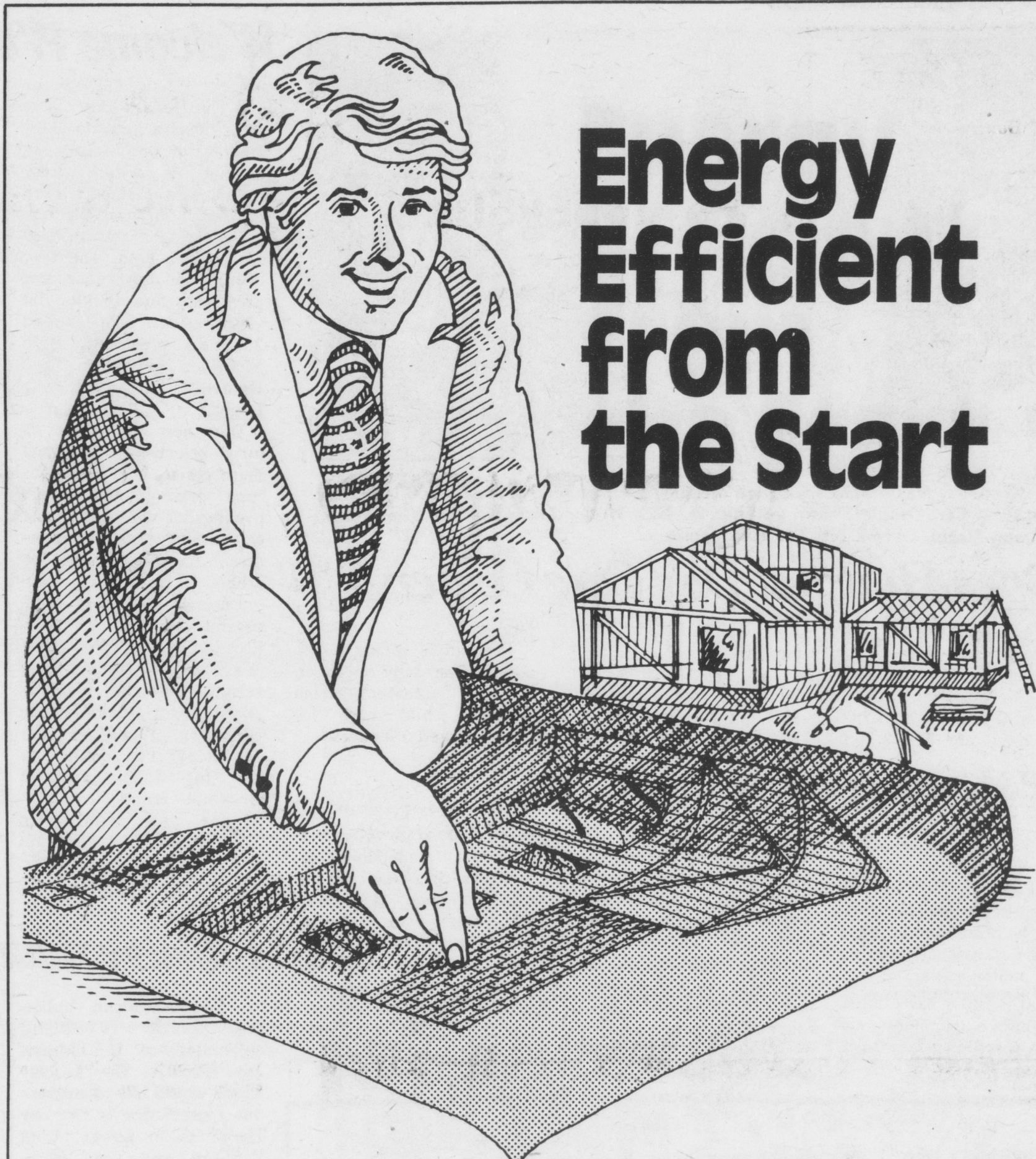

# Energy Efficient from the Start

## If you're planning to build an electrically-heated home, the time to make it energy efficient is while it's under construction.

PP&L, in cooperation with area builders, established an Energy Efficient Home Program to identify homes that meet certain standards for insulation and sheathing, windows and doors, ventilation, heating and cooling, air duct systems, water heating and fireplaces (if one is installed).
