Street in Mount Joy. Rev. Dunsmore is a home representative for Presbyterian Homes, Inc.

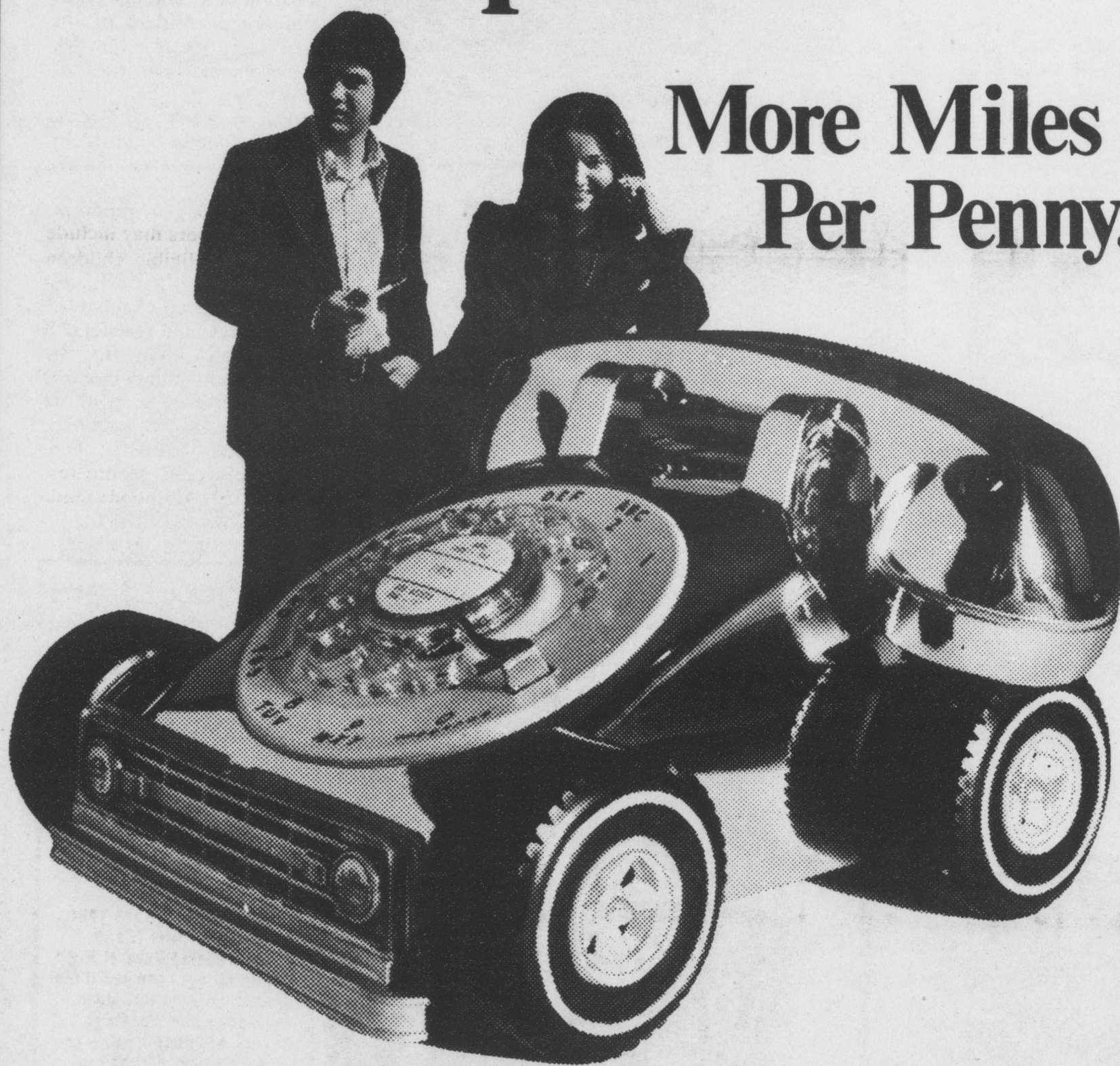
Rev. Dunsmore is interim pastor of Donegal Presbyterian Church for a period of eight months.

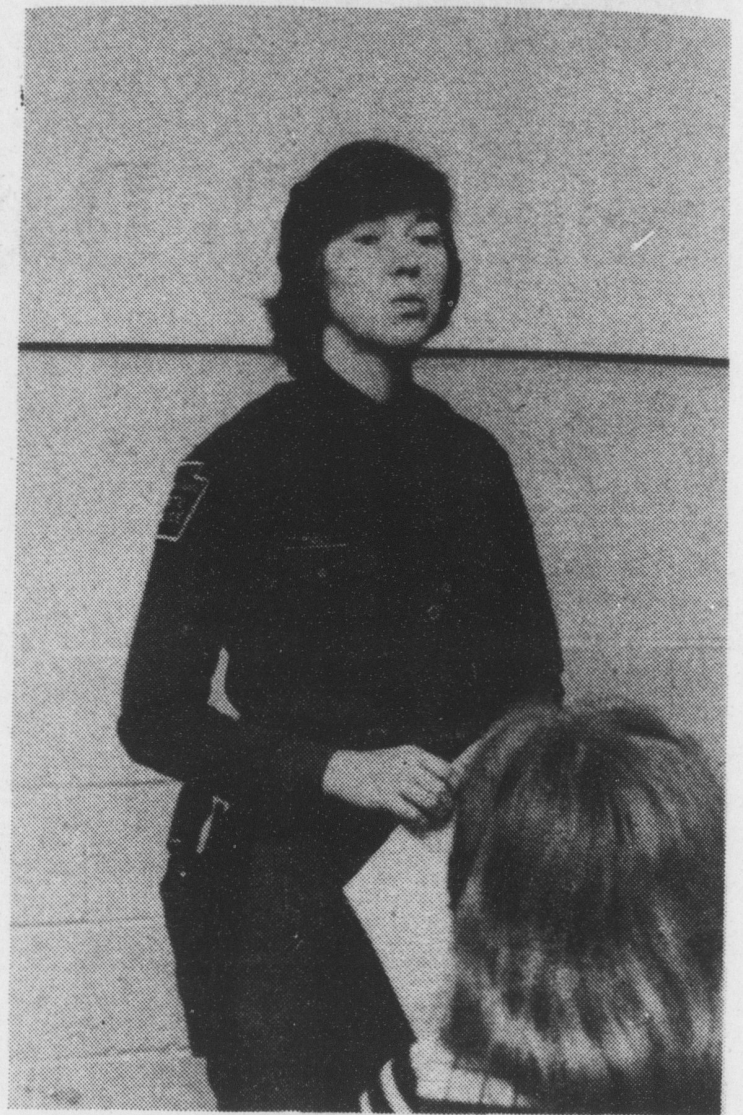
