

Miss Donegal Area Pageant

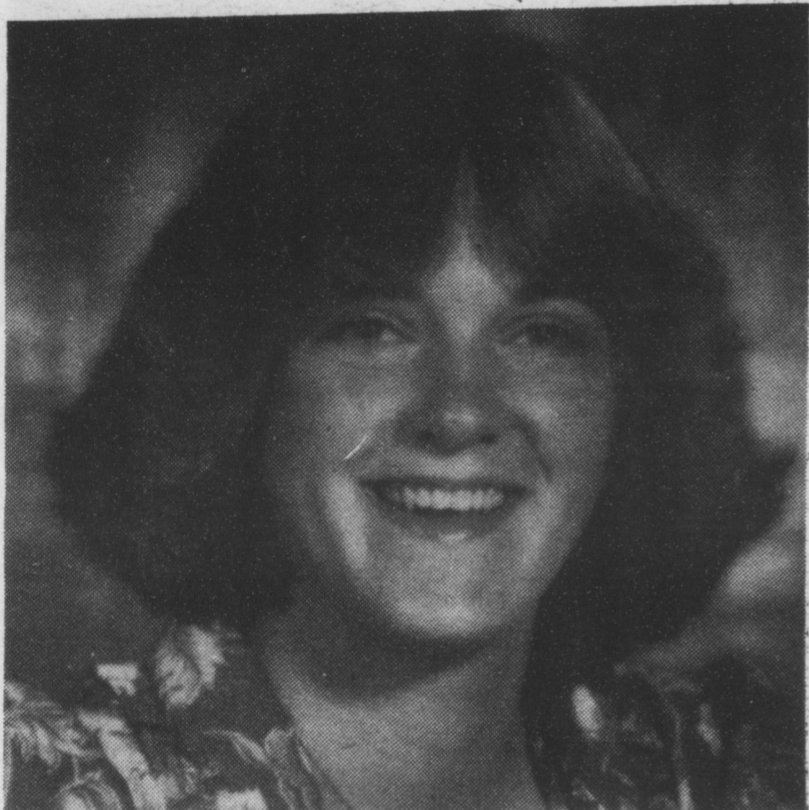
