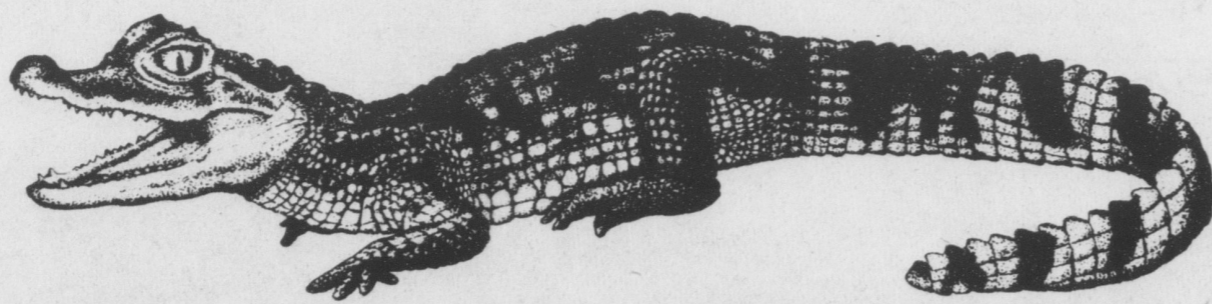
MRS. ELI RANDLER
