## Donegal School Board votes rate increase for bus service

The Donegal School Board last week voted to increase by three cents a mile the Johnson Bus Service rates.

The increase in rates was requested by Mr. Robert E. Johnson, president of the Johnson Bus Service, because of the inflated gas prices.

This increase will be paid until there is a change in the state formula index to allow for the inflated gasoline prices. State action is expected to take place in the near future. If the state formula permits a greater increase in the rates, Johnson Bus Service will be paid the difference retroactively.

The nine new teachers joining the Donegal District this year were invited to attend the meeting. Those who attended were introduced to the Board by Mr. Hallgren, district superintendent. The new teachers

for the 1979-80 school year are: John L. Felix, Jr., Deborah Geno, William G. Strausbaugh, Susan M. Ursprung, Mrs. Lesley Jo Schock, Brenda Eberly, Susan D. Reider, Mrs. Robin Wenger and Mrs. Kathleen Hughes. (See last week's *Times* for a story on the new teachers.)

The Board accepted the resignation of Miss Nancy G. Ettaro as interim teacher at Grandview. Miss Ettaro accepted a position with the pre-school program at Capital Area I.U.

The hiring of Miss Brenda Eberly, a Mount Joy resident, as a full-time substitute in the Grandview interim position was OK'ed by the Board.

Pablo Llorente, of Bosque De Echegaray, Mexico, will be attending Donegal High School as a sophomore. He will reside with Rev. and Mrs. Don Wert, pastor of Reich's EEC Church.

Youth Exchange Service (YES) is sponsoring the student. There will be no tuition costs charged.

Twelve district students attended the PA International Year of the Child Expo at Hershey on September 17. The shared bus expenses with a group from E-town and were chaperoned by Mr. Sites and Mr. Newcomer, along with some parents.

abethtown was denied. Mr. Erikson wants his daughter to attend Elizabethtown, because of their Vo-Ag course.

The Board denied the request because the student is in 7th grade and they do not feel that anyone below the high school level needs such a program.

Mr. Erikson is the new Vo-Ag teacher at Elizabethtown.

The Board, in other business, approved a contribution of \$265 to the North Museum in Lancaster. It was noted that although there were few school sponsored trips to the museum, other community groups such as the boy and girl scouts, did make use of the facilities.

Several issues concerning Governor Dick, in Mt. Gretna, were discussed at length.

ment bronze plaque marker stolen from the trail marker several years ago. The work and material donated for this plaque is estimated to be between \$1700 and \$2000 in value.

The snowmobile group is willing to conduct a tour of the area for interested board members and SICO Foundation. November 10 was set as the tentative date for such a tour.

Mr. McFarland, a high school wood shop teacher, requested permission to supervise students during non school hours to collect dead wood at Gov. Dick, and sell it for firewood. The proceeds would be used to purchase a planer for the high school shop. The planer would cost between \$3000 and \$5000.

President of the board Dale Arnold said the plan could be very beneficial for everyone involved, but he expressed concern over the use of power equipment

needed to do the job. The board tabled the issue until more information could be presented.

The board accepted the bid from Gus Miller Appliance Service, West Willow, for a Kold Draft C/F4 walk-in freezer in be installed at Riverview Elementary School. The cost, including installation, is \$3,495.

Permission to prepare and advise specifications for sidewalk and curbing repair in front of the junior high school was granted.

Permission was also granted to replace and relocate several locks in the Riverview storage area for security purposes. The estimated costs are \$233.66.

The board authorized the business manager to investigate the cost of having three boilers descaled. Deposits of sludge and scale in the water jackets of the boilers create a risk of damaging the boiler walls.
