include a young person from  
among the "problem"  
youth groups. "We should  
include a young person who  
can relate to the offending  
youths. Too often, kids are  
'turned off' by adult  
attitudes. The kids are part  
of the community, and they  
should be involved, too,"  
said Kenney.

## Trouble with loitering youths noted a year ago; need for recreational facilities was cited then

A little more than a year  
ago the **SUSQUEHANNA  
TIMES** reported on similar  
complaints by residents and  
merchants in downtown  
Marietta.

The **TIMES** interviewed  
Jim Hess, who acted as  
spokesman for the youths.  
Hess, at that time, com-  
plained that "there's not  
much to do in Marietta." He  
blamed the loitering on a  
lack of recreational facilities  
in the borough, and said, "If  
they gave us a place to go,  
we'd go there."

The **TIMES** also inter-  
viewed Marietta Police  
Chief Millar on the subject  
of the loiterers (who claimed  
that the police were  
"hassling" them). Millar  
sympathized with the kids'  
lack of recreational facili-  
ties. He also stated that they  
were obstructing sidewalks,  
interfering with pedestri-  
ans, and sometimes causing  
near-accidents in auto traffic  
on Market Street by  
throwing objects into the  
street and startling drivers.

At that time Marco's was  
identified as the gathering

place for the kids, and  
residents were presenting a

petition to Marietta Council  
requesting that action be

taken against loitering at  
Marco's.

## Marietta awards paving, surfacing contracts, opens bidding for sewer

In other business, council  
opened bids on several  
projects.

B.R. Kreider Inc., Man-  
heim, was awarded a \$4,000  
contract for the removal of  
the existing road surface  
and the resurfacing of  
Mulberry Street from Mar-  
ket to Front Streets. Jay  
Roberts, council finance  
chairman, said this is the  
first phase in the eventual  
reconstruction of all streets  
in the borough and said that  
all future resurfacing will  
require curbing to seal the  
macadam.

Bob Smith Contractor,  
Maytown, was awarded a  
\$6,728 contract for sidewalk  
and curbing on the New  
Haven Street side of the  
borough hall.

Bids were also opened on  
the three-phase storm  
drainage project in the  
borough, but they must be  
reviewed by the borough  
solicitor and the Lancaster  
County Redevelopment Au-  
thority before contracts can  
be awarded.

The project will eventual-  
ly include drainage work on  
Bridge, Essex, Front, Cher-  
ry and New Haven Streets.

Council also agreed to  
endorse the purchase by  
Lancaster County of 29 acres  
adjoining the borough as  
park land. The council had  
opposed the purchase, but  
representatives from the  
Lancaster County Planning  
Commission and the Lan-  
caster County Park Board  
fully explained the project

on Tuesday.

Trick or treat night was  
set for Oct. 30, from 7 to  
9 p.m. Permission was given  
to the Marietta Jaycees to  
hold their annual Halloween  
parade on Oct. 29 beginning  
at 7 p.m. in the west side of  
the borough and proceeding  
to the Riverview School.

The resignation of Lisa  
Coble, police department  
secretary, was accepted.

Council approved the  
closing of Tillman Alley  
from Hazel Avenue to  
Prospect Alley.

Council commended The  
Marietta Restoration Asso-  
ciates in its 14th annual  
Christmas By Candlelight  
Tour to be held December 2,  
from 2 to 7 p.m.
