2. What, do you feel, are

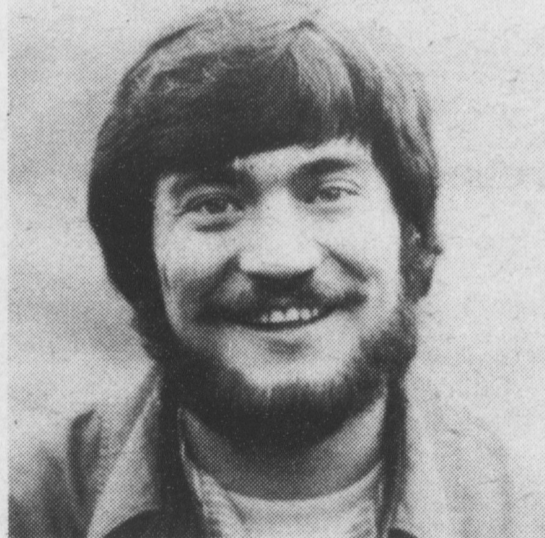
your particular qualifications for the job of school director?
