

# Maytown firemen answer 16 calls; Ney, Johns life members

February was a busy month for the Maytown firemen as they responded to a total of 16 calls.

Fire Chief Charles Shaffner reported the fire calls involved 3 vehicle accidents, 1 structure fire, 6 assist calls, 1 brush fire, 2 chimney fires, 1 smoke investigation and 2 standbys for neighboring fire companies.

A total of 182 firemen responded to the month's calls, and fire equipment was in service 22 hours. Property damage for East Donegal Township was estimated at \$45,300. Endangered property saved was estimated at \$185,000.

Fire company members Joe Ney and Sam Johns were recently presented

lifetime memberships in recognition of their many years of service. Both members are still actively serving as company fire police. Fire company member Ruth McConnell has been appointed to the position of fire company photographer. Larry Warfel has been elected to the office of Chief Engineer.

The fire company has put

in service 1200 feet of 3" supply line recently purchased by East Donegal Township. A 5 watt portable radio has been purchased by the fire company. It has been put into service, providing better radio communications.

The firemen will be holding a chicken bar-B-Q Saturday, March 29, starting at 10:00 am. Harland

Miller will be the barbequer. Deliveries will be made to Rowenna, Rivermoor and Marietta. The times of delivery will be announced at a later date.

Firemen will be washing cars April 5 starting at 8:00 am. Plan on getting your car washed for Easter. Fee will be by donation.
