A veteran of the U.S. Navy in World War II, he was a retired employee of the federal government.

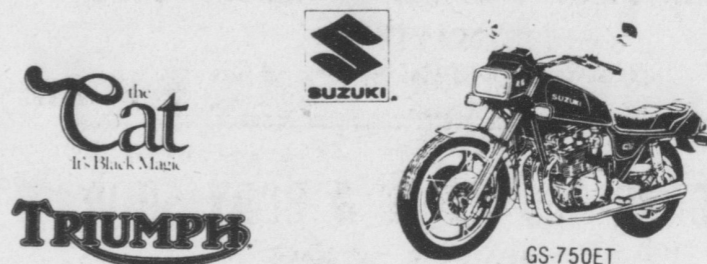
