## Members honored by Reich's ECC

Two members (lifelong) of Reich's Evangelical Congregational Church, Marietta R1, were honored at a Sunday School banquet held at Hostetters Banquet Hall, Mount Joy, Thursday night. Also honored for her many years of perfect attendance was Mrs. Pauline Garman, Bainbridge. Children and adults with high attendance records were recognized.

Richard Keller, current superintendent of the Sunday School presented each of the honored guests with gifts from the congregation.

A surprise tribute was given to John Roland, S. Market St., Elizabethtown who served as Sunday School superintendent from 1935 to 1963. He was a class leader and assistant to the Pastor from 1926 to 1968. Roland was elected to the Board of Trustees from 1920 to 1963 and a lay delegate to church conferences from 1928 to 1959. He was also instrumental in the construction of the present parsonage.

A retired farmer, Roland is the father of five children: Lester Roland, Mount Joy; Mrs. Warren Railing, Mt. Nebo; Mrs. Ken Johns, R1 Marietta; Mrs. Harold Gerber, R1 Elizabethtown; and Mrs. Frank Peifer. Also attending were two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Shuman, Maytown, and Mrs. Martha Seibert, and one brother, Russell Roland, both of Elizabethtown.

Also honored for his many years of devotion was Howard Sipling, Rheems, a retired building contractor. Church records show that he attended Sunday School in 1916 and became a Sunday School teacher in 1917. He was the building contractor for the church addition in

1955 and was instrumental in the construction of the new parsonage.

Elected to the Board of Trustees until 1975, Sipling and his wife attend services regularly. The couple has one daughter, Mrs. Earl Hecht, Rheems.

The Reverend Don Wert, current pastor of Reich's

offered the invocation and served as master of ceremonies.

The calls consisted of four vehicle accidents assisting the Maytown Ambulance, one tanker assist to the Mount Joy Fire Co., one tanker assist for Elizabeth-town-Mount Joy Forest Fire Crew, one car fire, one dumpster fire, one standby in the Marietta station and one reported brush fire handled by the Marietta Fire Co. No property damage was reported for East Donegal Township.


# Hist. Soc. will meet April 21
