The new publication, Conestoga Crossroads, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, 1730-1790, is by Jerome H. Wood, Jr. The book depicts the early history of Lancaster County and emphasized the problems in forging a community out of diversified ethnic, religious and socio-economic philosophies.

Since "Hon" (as Pauline Engle was affectionately known) was a great lover of animals, the second book chosen is A Dog of Your Own by M.A. Stoneridge. This book is a complete guide to selection, caring for, training, showing, breeding and enjoying your dog. It contains many interesting and amusing facts, photographs and delightful drawings. It is a book that should appeal to dog lovers-both school children and adults.


