In these complex times when our survival depends on logical and profound thinking, many Americans have simply "tuned out" and turned to the simple solutions of the evangelist who offers to think for them. The process of thinking for oneself is often tiresome and time consuming, but the rewards of self-sufficiency make it all worthwhile. Beware of those who claim to have the total truth. Truth is a process that has yet to reach totality.

Galileo, Martin Luther King, Copernicus, Jesus Christ, Karl Marx, Susan Anthony. . .all challenged the truths of their day and changed the course of history.

If you wonder what theistic governments are like, take a look at European history and discover how the Dark Ages came about. For a more recent example, watch the developments in Iran under Khomeini and the Mullahs. The spectre of "Big Brotherism" is slavery of the mind, no matter what name is used to justify it; Moral Majority, Ku Klux Klan, John Birch Society, or religion. Take heed Americans. Today your vote, tomorrow your minds. Start now if you haven't done so already. Study the issues realistically. Dig out the facts. Weigh the options. Consider the alternatives and their consequences. Then go the polls, vote intelligently, and feel proud that you did it yourself.

Members of the fire company would like to thank the members of the Maytown American Legion Auxiliry and their president, Sara Gutshall, for the gift of the fire hose and the American flag.


