# New Postal Order Will B

Reform in the handling second class mail matte carrying contemplated in the recent orders master General, promises t pectations. So far as ca those who have been illeg the Postet all exenjoying the one cent a pound rate preparing to submit to the new order allowed Reasonable time wil publishers of such periodicals and books as are excluded under the recent order to comply with the regulations, the purpose being not to work any undue hardship by immedately cutting them out of the second class mail.

There was a disposition on the part of some of the firms that will suffer most under a strict enforcement of the law to contest the new regulations in court. It is gratifying to the postoffice officials to learn that, where these firms have consulted the best legal authority they have been advised to abandon their purpose enter suit, as an examination of the law shows they would have no case. This ad-vice was given to one of the largest firms, whose books will be excluded under the new regulation, by one of the best lawyers in the United States. In order there may be no harsh enforcement of the new regulations, Third Assistant Postmaster General Madden has issued instructions to postmasters relative their application.

#### Chinamen Cannot Land.

Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Taylor received telegrams from ship-owners and masters of vessels lately arowners and masters of vessels lately arrived in San Francisco stating that owing to the strike there they are unable to unload their vessels and by ing that Chinamen employed on the ships be permitted to unload the vessels. The masters and owners guarantee to the masters and owners guarantee to the government that the Chinamen will not be permitted to go beyond the wharves and to prevent their escape. Secretary Taylor has replied, holding that this would be a violation of the Chinese Extension of the Chin clusion Act and refusing to allow the Chinamen to go upon the docks.
