"Fly nets for horses in harness are old as the hills," said a dealer in horse equipments, reports the New York Sun. "but saddle fly nets, for saddle horses, are something comparatively new. They are made fit around the cantle of the saddle, rom, which they extend back over the horse's haunches. The net is made of leather cords, commonly in russet, sometimes in black, attached across in parallel lines to five bars or tapes running lengthwise of the horse's back, the free ends of the cords hanging in the usual manner at the horse's sides.

"As to appearance such a net, seen on a saddle horse, is not only entirely sightly and appropriate there, but it gives to the horse's outfit a touch of picturesqueness.

"Another comparatively new thing for a rider's use is the fly riding whip which has, attached to a handle of about the same length, a hair switch about 18 inches in length. This is something not intended for park use, for which the saddle fly net is entirely suitable, but rather for use in witching the flies off a horse while ding along on the highways and yways; perhaps on a short-tailwere particularly bother-

MENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION PRO POSED TO THE CITIZENS OF THIS COM-MONWEALTH FOR THEIR APPROVALOR RE JECTION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH, IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII, OF THE CONSTITUTION.

A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth

SECTION 1—Be it resolved by the Senate and the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth in General Assembly met, That the following is pro-posed as Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in accordance with the provisions of the eighteenth article thereof :

Amendment One to Article Eight, Section One. Add at the end of the first paragraph of said section after the words "shall be entitled to a vote at all elec tions, " the words "subject, however, to such law requiring and regulating the registration of elector as the General Assembly may enact, " so that th said section shall read as follows :

SECTION 1-Qualifications of Electors. Every ma citizen, twenty-one years of age, possessing the fol owing qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all

elections, subject, however, to such laws requiring eral Assembly may enact : 1-He shall have been a citizen of the United State at least one month.

2-He shall have resided in the State one year having previously been a qualified elector or native born citizen of the State, he shall have removed there from and returned, then six months) immedia

preceding the election. 3-He shall have resided in the election district where he shall offer to vote at least two months ediately preceding the election.

4-If twenty-two years of age and upwards, shall have paid within two years a State or Count tax, which shall have been assessed at least tw onths and paid at least one month before the election Amendment Two to Article Eight, Section Seven.

Strike out from said section the words "but elector shall be deprived of the privilege of voting reason of his name not being registered, " and add to said section the following words, "but laws regulat ing and requiring the registration of electors may be enacted to apply to cities only provided that such laws be uniform for cities of the same class, '' so that the said section shall read as follows :

SECTION 7-Uniformity of Election Laws. All laws regulating the holding of elections by the citizens for the registration of electors shall be unifor throughout the State, but laws regulating and requi ing the registration of electors may be enacted to ap-ply to cities only, provided that such laws be uniform for cities of the same class. Strike out section four of article eight and insert in place thereof, as follows : SECTION 4-All elections by the citizens shall be by ballot or by such other method as may be prescribe by law : Provided that secrecy in voting be preserved.
