YESTERDAY'S ELECTION

A Very Interesting Fight in Both Wards for High and Ward Constable

Eli Williams Defeats Wm. Donaghy for High Constable—Andrew Weidman Had a Close Call for Ward Constable in the East End—Jac. Fissel Defeats Chas. Culp.

Although there was little opposition at yesterday's election, it was very interesting. In the East End it was nip and tuck between Andrew Weidman, the Republican candidate and Ed Henry, who was running independent, but the former pulled through by the narrow margin of two votes. In the West Ward, Jacob Fissel defeated Charles Culp. Although the latter was supported by several Republicans, his party and the "floaters," Fissel was victorious by a majority of 43 votes. The High Constable fight between Williams and Donaghy is also worthy of note. The former's name only appeared on the West Ward ballots but when the vote was counted he had 17 to spare.
