Father Mysterous.

Mrs. H. H. Brandt of No. 11 South Mary Street, Lancaster, formerly of this place, wife of Confectioner Brandt, was hurt under rather mysterious circumstances on of land in West Donegal, \$1,000. Sunday evening, while she was on her way to church with her child Near the corner of West King and Mary streets she suddenly felt a blow back of the right ear, and, putting her hand up, found a scalp wound which bled freely. Believing she was shot, Mrs. Brandt hurried as fast as possible to Dr. Prizer's office, where the wound was dressed It looked as though it might have been made by an air rifle or a torpedo, Police Sergeant Negley, who looked up the case, inclining to the latter belief. A Mr. Fisher, who resides in the neighbor of the occurrence, saw a couple of young men run away just after Mrs. Brandt was hurt, and other persons say they heard a shot. So far the police have not learned who the person was who hurt Mrs. Brandt. The affair created considerable excitement in the vicinity of West King and Mary streets.
