FILLING A FOUNTAIN PL

This May Be the Experience of the Awkward or Nervous

Filling .. fountain pen is a sask that requires a steadiness of hand, o clear eye and a quiverless nerve. It also requires a bottle of ink, a dropper and a fountain pen, says the Detroit Free Press. Having the necessary tools one should next stock up on patience and blotting paper. He will need both The dropper is supposed to gently shoot the ink into the pen. As a rule it shoots everywhere but in the pen mostly over the owner's white vest and his clean cuffs. That which misses the vest and the cuffs will find a rest ing place on his fingers.

After trying three or four times to persuade the ink to occupy the apart ment provided for it you may be able to blow an ink bubble over the top of the pen. Having finally filled the pen, you must screw down the top. In doing so you should strive to avoid sqeezing out the ink. Were Partaken of Reclining, a Pesition Singularly Appropriate to the Occasions.

"When Nero dined," said an actor recently, "there were three courses, eaten lying down, and dances went on, or contests of wild beasts, or even fights of gladiators, and the various shes were brought in to music by slaves who danced as they approached. "The first course was composed of hors d'oeuvres-eggs, British oysters, ettuce, olives and so on. To begin a neal with eggs still is popular in

Italy. "The second course comprised all the substantial foods. Turbot (a kind ornament for a churce but there is of giant flounder), peacock, flamingo, sucking pig, boar, venison and truffles were brought in upon a huge round tray carried by four or five dancing slaves. The third course was the dessert-

candies, fruits, pastries. "The guests at Nero's dinners put on dinner dresses of bright colors.
