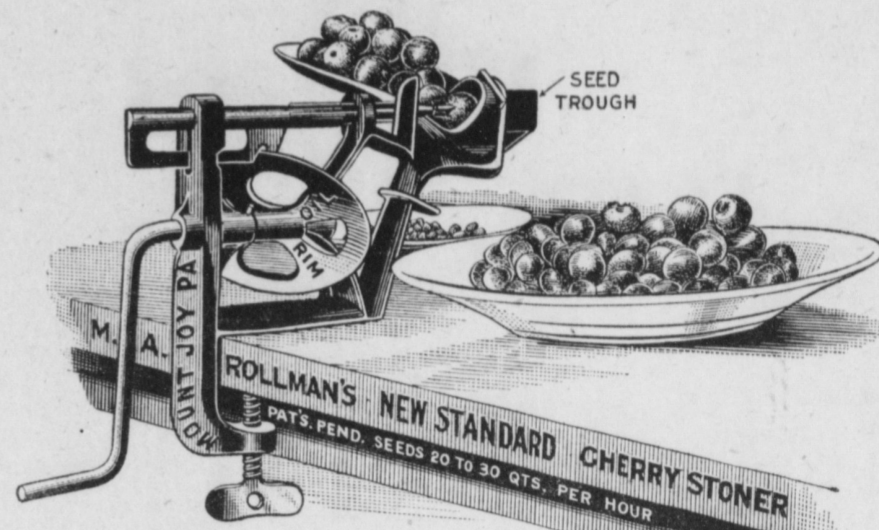
**Broke His Leg**
