**THE STATE'S AID.**

What the Authorities Are Doing for Tubercular Victims.

That the State aid extended to tubercular sufferers through the Department of Health dispensaries is reaching the really needy is evidenced by careful statistics that our Health Commissioner Dixon has just compiled.

These statistics which are based upon a total of 9,363 patients examined at the dispensaries, of whom 6,728 were found to have tuberculosis, during a period of seven consecutive months ending December 31, 1908 shows that the average family income in the homes from which these patients came was \$24.63 per month. The average number of persons in the family was 4.38 and the average per capita income \$5.60.

"These facts are particularly gratifying," said Dr. Dixon today. "With the thousands of tubercular patients who are asked to help it is quite possible that occasionally the state's charity is imposed upon. We are fully justified, by the tabulated records, in drawing the conclusion that the really needy poor among Pennsylvania's unfortunate victims of tuberculosis are the ones that are being helped, just as the law making the appropriation contemplated."

An interesting study of the possible source of infection can be made from the dispensary statistics. In 2,404 cases, there was reason to believe that the diseases were contracted in the home from another member of the family. This shows how important is the work which the visiting nurses of the dispensaries are doing in teaching the members of the household how to guard against being infected by one of the family who has the disease.

In 474 cases the possible source of infection was a fellow employe. Fully alive to the danger from this source the State Department of Health has communicated direct with all the large employers of labor thru out the state, urging the necessity of frequent medical inspection and calling attention to the State's dispensaries where suspected cases among the poor will be examined at any time free.

Sixty-two cash prizes are offered for corn. The apiculture. The Pennsylvania Agricultural Association has been secured. The Pennsylvania Agricultural College will make a display and demonstration. There will be a big butter, cheese and milk show. A notable show of horses, both stallions and geldings, will be held. McLaughlin Brothers of Columbus, Ohio, will furnish a select lot of fine Percheron and French Coach stallions, and Belgians, Clydesdales, Shires Suffolks, Arabians and Morgans will be shown. Cattle of leading beef and dairy breeds will be on hand. Cattle, sheep and swine will be used in demonstrations on foot and on the block, conducted by experts. Everything is free to the public.
