THE ROAD WHICH WE ALL MUST TRAVEL SOONER OR LATER

Some Well Known People From Our Neighborhood Have Passed to the Great Beyond Since Our Last Issue

Miss Elizabeth Kelly died at the home of her sister, Mrs. Sarah J. Worrall, in Marietta, Friday morning aged seventy-seven years, from paralysis.

David Roth

David Roth, a native of Marietta, but for the past 40 years a clerk in the pension department at Washington, D. C. died in that place Tuesday from a complication of diseases. The deceased was past 79 years of age.

Mrs. Mary A. Webster

The remains of Mrs. Mary A. Webster were brought here from Harrisburg on Friday where her death occurred on Tuesday at the home of Rev. C. H. Grove, her son-in-law. Deceased was in her seventy-third year. She had formerly lived in this place.

Mrs. Margaret Campbell

The funeral of Mrs. Margaret Campbell took place Sunday at the Mennonite church in Elizabethtown, interment in the cemetery adjoining Bossler's church. Her death occurred on Wednesday. Deceased was seventy eight years old. There survive six children: Jacob, John, William, Mrs. Milton Hellman, Mrs. Amanda Greenly and Mrs. William Bamesderfer, all of Elizabethtown.

Joseph D. Snively

Joseph D. Snively died at his home in Rapho township from pneumonia, aged thirty-two years. He was a farmer by occupation and a member of the Mennonite church. He is survived by a wife and two children, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin H. Snively, of Rapho township, and the following brothers and sisters: Emma, wife of John Haldeeman, of Donegal, and Elizabeth, wife of Jacob W. Wenger, of Rapho.

Mrs. Amanda Keener

Mrs. Amanda Keener, wife of Clayton Keener, of near Keener's mill, Rapho township, died on Tuesday afternoon, from a complication of diseases, aged thirty-three years. She was a daughter of the late David Ehrhart, of near Manheim, and was a member of the Lutheran church of Manheim. Her husband and three children survive, Jacob, David and Walter. The funeral will take place on Thursday morning from the Lutheran church, Manheim, with interment in Fairview cemetery.

Frank Gramm

Frank Gramm, of Philadelphia, a former resident of this place, died on Wednesday morning at the age of forty-nine years. He was a tailor by trade, and for a number of years he worked at this business for John Wanamaker. There survive his wife and three sons. Deceased was a son of ex-Burgess John Gramm, who also survives, as does one brother, Squire S. B. Gramm, of Marietta, and one sister, Mrs. Emma Snively, of Harrisburg. He was a member of the Presbyterian church. His remains were brought from his late home at Philadelphia to the home of his brother-in-law, Peter Sultzbach of Marietta, from which place the funeral took place on Sunday afternoon at two o'clock. The funeral was private.

It now transpires that Gramm committed suicide. He was found at the East Park reservoir with two bullet wounds in his head and a revolver near him. When first seen he was still alive and was placed in an ambulance and taken to the German Hospital, where he died. No motive is known for the rash deed.

Dr. S. P. Lytle.

Dr. S. P. Lytle, the well known dentist and horseman, and one of the largest real estate owners in Mount Joy, died very suddenly this morning. He was sixty years old and is survived by his wife and brother Charles in the west, and two sisters, Miss Belle and Mrs. Michael Detwiler of this place. Dr. Lytle has practiced dentistry in this place for a generation. He had a very large acquaintanceship among the country people of this part of Lancaster county and on account of his genial qualities and his acquaintanceship, in his younger days, was a leader in many social functions of Mount Joy, Rapho and the Donegals. Dr. Lytle's family has always been connected with the Donegal and Mount Joy Presbyterian churches, and his ancestry included the Scotts, Pedans and many of the prominent Scotch-Irish families that settled in this vicinity in the early days. Eligible as a son of the American Revolution and the Society of the Cincinnati,

he never embraced the privilege. He was possibly the last male person of strictly Scotch-Irish descent in Mt. Joy. Funeral services will be held on Saturday afternoon at 1.30 in the Presbyterian church of this place with interment in the Mount Joy cemetery.

Jacob E. Loraw

Jacob Eichelberger Loraw died on Sunday afternoon at his residence on West Donegal street, aged seventy-five years. He was a son of the late George Loraw. He was born and raised in Rapho township, along the Little Chiques creek, three miles north of this place. He carried on butchering for many years. He was also an extensive dealer in cattle and horses. He had also been in the hotel business. He is survived by his wife and two brothers, John E. Loraw, of this place, and Henry E., of Lebanon. The funeral was held this afternoon with services in the United Brethren church.

Joseph W. White.

Joseph W. White, a native and life long resident of Back Run, in Rapho township, died at the home of Mrs. Caroline Krall, at Manheim, to which place he had gone on a visit only a few days before his demise. The cause of his death was grip and complications. He was 85 years of age and a consistent member of the Church of the Brethren. He was an expert post-fence maker and had worked at that business all his life. He is survived by his wife and the following children: Joseph White and Mrs. Fannie Good, Shannon, Illinois; Sallie, wife of Henry Krall of Lebanon; Benjamin White of Sporting Hill; Mrs. Minnie Hummel, living at his former home at the Back Run. The funeral took place from the Krall home at Manheim this forenoon with services in the Church of the Brethren, at Manheim, and interment at Henney's burial ground north of that place.

TWO FIRES YESTERDAY

Cotton Mill No. 2 and Benj. Blocher's Residence Were Ablaze

Yesterday Friendship Fire Company responded to two fire calls. The first occurred at the home of Benj. Blocher, who tenants the W. B. Detwiler property on West Main street. The chimney was ablaze and the flames were soon extinguished, without even a fire alarm. This blaze occurred about ten o'clock.

At 4.15 the alarm was sounded and the company immediately responded to the call. This time No. 2 cotton mill of George Browns Sons was on fire. The fire started near the engine room at the west end of the building and the employees acted in the capacity of fire fighters. The flames gained considerable headway and an alarm was sent in. In just eight minutes after the sound of the fire alarm, the 50 horse power gasoline fire engine, with over 100 lbs of pressure, was pouring an inch-and-a-half stream on the burning interior of the building thru 850 feet of hose and within fifteen minutes the flames were extinguished.

The damage by water was greater than the fire damage.
