New Industry for Elizabethtown

Arrangements have been completed by the Board of Trade of Elizabethtown for the location in that borough of the plant of the Samuel Morris company, of Newark, N. J., manufacturers of electric light and gas light poles for municipal purposes and all kinds of gas and electric fixtures. Of the \$10,000 required for the establishment of the new plant \$7,000 has already been subscribed and work has already been begun on the new plant, which will be 50 by 200 feet with a storage room 50 by 40 feet. The company will be capitalized at \$10,000 and will employ between twenty-five and fifty skilled mechanics.

R. R. Station Will Be Moved

Juror Had Absented Himself Without Permission.

Mr. David Z. Witmer of Elizabethtown, who absented himself from court without leave, thereby blocking the proceedings of the murder trial, was hailed before Judge Landis on Wednesday.

Mr. Witmer was asked by the court to explain his absence from court on Tuesday afternoon. His counsel, B. J. Myers, stated that after court Witmer went to the Franklin House and after eating his dinner he was taken ill, went to bed and remained there until evening. He did not know that he was wanted in court and was sorry that he had put the court to inconvenience.

Judge Hassler said that the court was put to great inconvenience by Witmer absenting himself. If he was taken ill he should have notified the court and he could have been excused. The court cannot allow the juror to go unpunished for his absence and neglect to notify the court. A fine of \$10 and the costs of attachment were placed on Witmer, he was discharged from any further attendance as a juror this week and the sheriff directed to take charge of Witmer until the fine and costs are paid.

Fire Company for Salunga

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COMMITTED SUICIDE

Mr. John S. Martin, of Elizabethtown Found Dead in His Barn
