MASONIC FLAG RAISING

It Took Place on New Home Site at Elizabethtown.

Great preparations have been made by the different committees in charge for the flag raising to-day on the Masonic Home site at Elizabethtown, just opposite the P. R. R. station. Last week the large ninety foot pole donated by a prominent Mason of Clearfield was raised. The pole is planted in six feet of cement, has a large gilt ball on the top, and can be seen at a great distance. This afternoon the first public demonstration was held on the plot, when a large flag was flung to the breeze which will designate the plot to passengers on the train. This flag, a post flag, as well as a garrison flag and storm flag, all three are donated by Amos E. Beiler, Commissioner of Corporations of the State Department of Harrisburg, who is a prominent Mason, and who will also be present to present the flag. An excursion was run from Lancaster, where the convolve of Knights Templar is in session. It is thought that over four hundred delegates and their friends left Lancaster this morning and spent several hours on the site. Many prominent Masons from all parts of the State were present, among them Judge George B. Orady, of Huntingdon, and ex-Mayor Guthrie, of Pittsburg, who were leading factors in having the home located there. The Williamsport Band furnished music. They will lay over several hours upon their return home from the convention. The public schools of the borough were invited to be present. Over 350 pupils were assembled on the grounds and sang patriotic hymns. This event marks the beginning of what the citizens of Elizabethtown little dreamed of a quarter of a century ago. Future developments as planned by the Committee will make this one of the garden spots of the world.
