## Our Schools

### WHO WILL WIELD THE WILLOW THE COMING TERM

Borough and Township School Boards Organize and Elect Teachers—Those Who Will Have Charge of Our Borough Schools Are Appointed.

The following School Boards met on Monday afternoon and evening for reorganization and election of teachers as follows:

### Mount Joy Borough

The school directors of our borough met on Monday evening and organized as follows: President, Mr. G. Moyer; Secretary, Mr. H. S. Newcomer; Treasurer, First National Bank. The other members of the Board are Messrs. H. G. Longenecker, E. W. Bentzel, John S. Eby and Dr. E. W. Newcomer. Mr. John Greenawald was elected janitor. The school term was made nine months for the high school and eight months for the graded schools. The tax rate was fixed at 6 mills for school purposes and one mill sinking fund, which total is same as last year. Schools will open September 5. The salaries are as follows: Principal, \$125 per month; assistant High, \$65 and the remainder the same as heretofore. This is a handsome increase for the principal.

A special meeting of the Board will be held on Monday evening for the purpose of electing a teacher for the Intermediate school.

### FEAST OF ROSES

#### Details of Arrangements for the Affair Announced

Manheim will have a gala day on Sunday June 12, when the annual observance of the Feast of Roses will take place. Details in reference to the events have been announced. The services will begin at 9 a. m. when prominent visitors will address the large Sunday school of Zion Lutheran church, Manheim. This will be followed by the morning memorial service, at which Rev. A. H. F. Fischer, D. D., of Easton, will preach the sermon.

The memorial service proper will begin at 1.30 o'clock. J. H. Sieling, M. D., of York, the founder of the Feast of Roses, will deliver the memorial address. This will be followed by addresses by Governor Edwin S. Stuart, Rev. A. H. F. Fischer, D. D., of Easton, and Rev. A. O. Bartholomew, president of the Manheim Ministerial Association. Charles W. Eaby, esq., of Lancaster, will pay the legal debt of "one red rose" for the tenure of ground, whereupon the church stands. An heir of Baron Henry William Stiegel, who donated the plot of ground in consideration of this unique rental, will receive the rose. Mayor McClain, of Lancaster, has also promised to attend. The choir of the church will render several select anthems, and there will also be congregational singing. The Children's Day services by the Sunday school will be held at 6 p. m.

### What Won't They Do?

The gasoline engine has again been made to do the work of one or a pair of horses on two farms west of Florin Messrs. J. G. Reist and Rev. Daniel Eshleman each have an engine with which to do chopping, threshing, etc. and recently these engines were equipped with clutch pulleys and now are used to unload hay from the wagon to the mow.

One man works the hay hook and by means of a rope from the engine to the wagon, operates the clutch, thus doing the work of an extra boy or man and one or two horses. This is quite a help and many other farmers are following this example.

## Boro Council

### THE REGULAR JUNE MEETING HELD MONDAY NIGHT.

Proposed Ordinance Presented for S. Barbara Street—General Health of the Borough Good—New Crossings Ordered—Bills Paid Etc.

When Mount Joy Borough Council convened on Monday night but four members Messrs. J. G. Reist, Jonas Risser, B. S. Dillinger and George H. Brown answered the roll. Burgess Hoffman and Clerk Fellenbaum also present.

A letter was read from Mr. Titzel of the Conestoga Traction Company relative to conveying fire apparatuses to various points. Same was referred to the Burgess.

Burgess Hoffman reported the receipt of the following resolution which was read:

Whereas: Adeline C. Strickler, late of the Borough of Mount Joy, has by her last will and testament, given from her bounty to the Burgess and Council of the Borough of Mt. Joy, Pa., the sum of Two Thousand Dollars, in trust, the interest or income from the same to be applied to the purchase of coal for the use of the worthy poor of the said Borough of Mount Joy.

Therefore, Be it Resolved, by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Mount Joy, Pa., that the said Burgess and Council, in and on behalf of the said Burgess and Council; and that the Borough Treasurer be and is hereby authorized to receive the said fund of Two Thousand Dollars from the Executor of the last will and testament of the said Adeline C. Strickler, deceased, and upon the payment of the same to him to execute and deliver to her said executor a proper release for the same.

And, Be it Further Resolved: That the said fund of Two Thousand Dollars be set apart and invested and known as the "Adeline C. Strickler Poor Coal Fund", and the incomes arising therefrom be applied as the same may arise for the purposes for which the said fund was created by the donor.

On motion of Mr. Reist, seconded by Mr. Dillinger the foregoing resolution was adopted.

The Burgess president of council and chairman of the Street committee were instructed to look for an investment for said fund.

Burgess Hoffman reported having granted building permits to Mr. Jno. Beamesderfer and Mr. Abner Hershey for new houses and collected \$16.87 the past month.

Mr. Frank Kleffer, superintendent of the Manheim and Mount Joy Electric Light Company, complained about the number of electric light globes that are being broken on the streets by boys playing ball and asked for permission to post printed notices on the company's poles in the borough. The Burgess was ordered to sanction this privilege.

Mr. Reist of the Street committee, reported Poplar street graded and ready for macadamizing, started grading Frank street, removed all the scrapings from the streets, filled the mud-holes on several streets with cinder, crossings that were ordered have been laid and gave grades for several pavements.

He recommended these crossings: Relay the one across Marietta street on the east side of Comfort alley with Bolen block; lay a new crossing across Marietta street from the residence of Mr. Amos Bender to the residence of Mr. A. S. Flowers; relay with Bolen block the crossing on the south side of Main street across South Market; a new crossing on New St. on the west side of Barbara. All the recommendations were ordered.

Mr. George Baughman asked that New street be graded. Referred to the Street committee. Mr. Reist also recommended filling in the gutters on both sides of Main street from S. B. Bernhart's store to Barbara street. Also at the residence of Dr. J. J. Newpher or anywhere else that the Street committee thinks it necessary.

Mr. Dillinger of the Water committee, reported having purchased the private main of Mr. George Baughman on New street, posted notices about trespassing, removing sod, etc., and the pipes and plugs ordered have not yet arrived. The subsidence basin was ordered cleaned but the reservoir will not be cleaned until later.

Mr. Risser of the Ordinance committee, presented a proposed ordinance for South Barbara street which appears in another column.

Mr. H. Gillums, of the Board of Health, reported the general health of the borough good, one case of typhoid fever and the measles and mumps epidemic about over.

Mr. John S. Nissley and Mr. Albert Strickler were before Council in the interest of opening or rather extending West Donegal street from the residence of Mr. John Miller west, parallel with the trolley tracks.

The matter was referred to the Street committee to investigate and report at the next meeting of Council.

The treasurer's report showed a balance of \$2,300 in the Water account and \$1,700 in the Borough account.
