BRENNEMAN REUNION
Largest and Best in History of the Family Held August, 25th, Near Orrville, Ohio.

From the Orrville, Ohio, Courier.
Thursday morning dawned clear and beautiful, giving promise and a final fulfillment of a most ideal day for an out-door gathering. Early in the morning the Breneman hosts began to gather at the beautiful grove of A. W. Breneman at East Union, about four miles northwest of Orrville, Wayne Co., for the annual re-union of that numerous and hospitable family, and when the count was completed, nearly three hundred had assembled in happy greeting. It was the largest and most successful re-union in the history of the family. All are profuse in their praise of the arrangements, and the beautiful grove is conceded to have been the most ideal spot in which this re-union was ever held.

Under the cool shade of the spreading trees dinner was served, and a grand dinner it was. Every thing toothsome that the good Breneman matrons could think of was laid before the 268 guests, and the hearty Breneman appetite was equal to the occasion. The resources of the family larder were not exhausted however, as 85 sat down to supper in the evening. Base ball was played in a field adjoining the grove, and the young Breneman generation played several exciting games.

About 1.30 p. m. the following programme was started on and successfully carried out: Opening address by the President, C. C. Weaver of Orrville, which was followed by prayer by Rev. Russell McGiffin of the Temple Lutheran Church, of Pittsburg. Next was an address of welcome by A. W. Breneman, at whose home the re-union was held. Mr. Breneman said he hoped the crowd would take charge of his place and make the re-union a successful one, and if any one went away displeased he would not be responsible. Next was a response by Mr. A. N. Breneman, a successful merchant of Orrville followed by music by the orchestra.

Mr. Warren Breneman next gave an essay on "Bald-headed men" and gave his reasons for so many men being bald-headed. The audience then all joined in singing that old familiar song, "America", which was followed by a recitation by Miss Alta Burkholder; also a song by Alfred, Walter and Florence Rarick. Another recitation by Fern Burkholder, followed by music by the Orchestra and another recitation by Lizzie Amstutz.

The following responded to a call by the President and gave short addresses: Squire Levi Breneman and S. P. Eshleman of Orrville, and A. B. Hambright, of Elizabethtown, Pa. Mr. Hambright wishing to uphold the fame of the Pennsylvania branch of the old family, proved his superiority by giving quite a lengthy address, giving the audience a complete history of the surviving Brenemans from his state. His address was much appreciated as some of the younger Breneman's of Ohio had up to this time known very little of the family from Pennsylvania.

The last speaker was Rev. Adam Breneman of Marshallville, Ohio, an aged and successful minister of the Old Mennonite church. Rev. Breneman revived the success of this and former re-unions, and praised the committees who had charge, and spoke of the good fellowship and the closer relationship which the family obtains by being all re-united once a year in happy re-unions of this kind. But said Rev. Breneman, another re-union will some day be held, which will be that heavenly re-union which will surely take place. He reminded the large audience that while such great preparations are being made annually for the successful carrying out of these gatherings, he hoped that every member of this earthly family re-union would also make special arrangements for the heavenly

some day another re-union can be held which will be far more successful.
Breneman referred very fittingly to "Uncle" Samuel Breneman who was sitting close to his side resting comfortably in a large rocker, now almost 84 years of age. Samuel is now the oldest surviving member of the Breneman family and was conveyed early in the morning to the grove by his son, A. N. Breneman in his automobile.
Twenty years ago Uncle Sam was stricken down with paralysis which left his right side completely paralyzed, and just about a year ago he was the victim of another stroke. His vitality is wonderful, and while being partially helpless, he is still able to walk alone for a short distance.

Mrs. C. C. Weaver, wife of the President presided at the organ while the entire programme was being rendered.
Next in order came the nomination and election of officers for the coming year. Amos Breneman moved that the present officers be retained for the coming year, who are as follows: C. C. Weaver, President; Eugene Breneman, Vice President; J. E. Breneman, Treasurer and S. M. Kapp, Secretary.

Owing to the eminent success of the re-union this year in Mr. Breneman's grove, Mr. A. N. Breneman moved that the re-union next year be held at the same place, which will be the last Thursday of August.
The following members present from the east were: A. B. Hambright, wife and daughter Irene and Mrs. Mary Breneman, Elizabethtown, Pa., Benjamin Hambright and wife, of Florin, Pa.
During the past year a special effort will be made to get a full and complete record and history of the Breneman family from the early forefathers from the time they set sail from Switzerland for this country to the present younger generations which will be read at the re-union next year.

Probably the only member of the family who was not present was Mr. Samuel Breneman of Orrville, a prominent and successful banker of the town, who is at present touring thru Europe with his two daughters in their large automobile, gathering data and information as to the names of the first Brenemans who came to this country, which was supposed to have been about the year 1700. It is known that they settled in Lancaster County, and were successful framers and later owned all the land on which now stands what is known as Willow Street, south of Lancaster.

Three brothers by the name of Henry, Adam and Benjamin who were grandchildren of the early settlers finally disposed of their farms and the two former moved to Wayne County with their families and the latter Benjamin, settled finally on a farm one mile north of Florin, Pa., where during his life time was a director and promoter of the school which still bears his name.
