

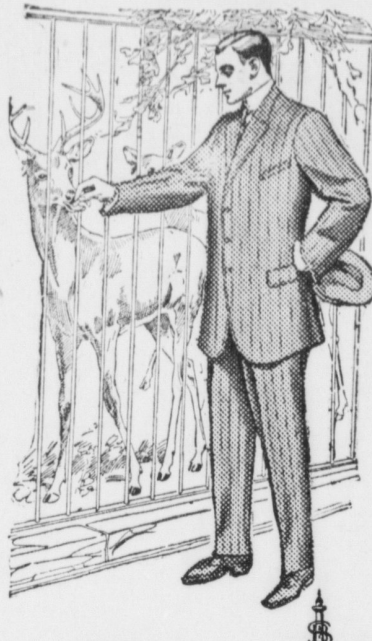
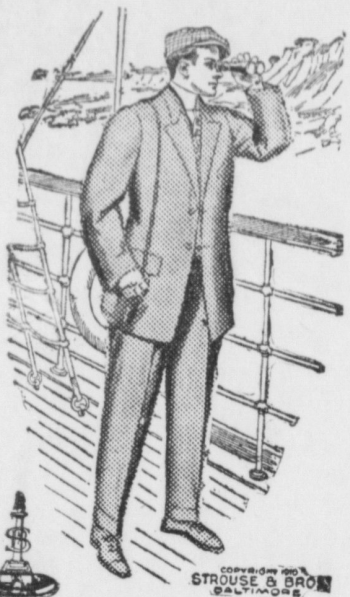

CHAPTER III

Valuable Information Relative to Road Making

The problem of maintaining the earth roads has been found so easy of solution by the King drag method that more attention should now be given to the ills which affect our macadam roads, especially if they can be remedied by correcting mistakes in maintenance at little or no additional expense. Unfortunately no device can be found that will be as simple and economical proportionately as the drag to make stone roads as nearly faultless in construction as a drudge on a dirt road. The work of the drag embodies a number of the fundamentals of road building but with the stone or macadam road each particular requisite must of necessity be obtained by a separate procedure.

Neglect to make repairs on a road at the first indication of wear is one of the mistakes to which many of the road officials of America are prone. Road construction and maintenance have reached a higher stage of development in Europe than in this country. There they have learned the need and value of good roads. One of their most valuable experiences has been the discovery that it is cheaper to maintain roads by repairing them at the first sign of trouble and that by so doing they have better roads all the time. One of the things the traveler in Europe first notices is the frequency of small piles of crushed stone along the highways, ready for use the moment it is seen that some attention is required on the road. European roads are inspected as thoroughly for trouble as are railroads in this country. And it is not done without reason. Costly experience has taught its lesson and America can well use the knowledge of road maintenance learned by the older countries. To do otherwise would be putting us back several hundred years in road science.

In road making as in medicine an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Some highways have not been built properly in the beginning, but even these can be kept in satisfactory shape if work is done upon them constantly and intelligently. "A stitch in time saves nine" is a familiar proverb particularly applicable in the case of roads. On all sides the general truth of it can be seen. It costs more in the end to repair a machine which has been allowed gradually to go to ruin. A farm is better for constant attention. Your house loses value if it is not painted and it will cost more to make repairs than it would have had to apply the paint.

"Repairs should be made when needed" says Maurice O. Eldridge, of the U. S. Office of Public Roads, "and not once a year after crops are laid by." One hundred days' labor, the year, will accomplish more and better work in the maintenance of an earth road than the same amount of labor expended in six days, especially if the six days are in August, September or October, when the ground is hard and dry.

It is a great mistake to put the working of an earth road off until August or September. The surface is then baked hard and dry. It is not only difficult to work, but is unsatisfactory work when done. Earth which is loose and dry will remain dusty as long as the dry weather lasts and then turn to mud as soon as the rain begins. In working the road in the spring of the year when the soil is soft and damp, the surface is more easily shaped and soon packs down into a dry, hard crust which is less liable to become dusty in summer or muddy in winter.

Let us then in maintaining both our earth and our stone roads constantly be alert to save money and have better roads by making repairs as soon as there is the slightest indication of their need. Furthermore, let us not crowd our work on the road into one particular time when it suits us best, but let us extend our attention to the road at all times when it suits the road best.

Disease of Chestnut Trees

Within the past few years an entirely new disease of the common chestnut tree has appeared. It is evidently spreading in all directions from the neighborhood of New York City where it was first observed. On Long Island, in Connecticut and Northern New Jersey it has proved so virulent that nearly all the chestnut trees are affected, and many of them have already died.

In Pennsylvania it is quite abundant throughout the eastern counties but in the central and western portions of the state it is still either lacking or but sparingly distributed. Like all other plants diseases it doubtless has its limitations and it is not likely that it will thrive in all sections where the chestnut tree grows. It is not unlikely that it may have already nearly reached the limit of its extension.

However, that may be, it is well worth the attention of all who have chestnut trees or timber. A strong effort should be made to arrest the progress of the disease so soon as it appears. This is not especially difficult; and now, before the leaves fall, is the time to do it. When a tree is attacked and becomes infected the fungus rapidly spreads in the bark and growing wood of twigs and branches. It progresses so fast that these parts in larger or smaller patches are soon disorganized, killed and somewhat shrunken. The leaves which depend upon these parts for their water and food supply wither and shrivel, but do not fall. These twigs or branches with their attached dead leaves are very plainly seen in contrast with the natural ones and mark the presence of this particular disease. Of course, branches may die from other causes, particularly attacks of boring insects, and mechanical breakage, but the difference is not difficult to detect.

If during the next six weeks a careful examination is made for this disease, particularly west of the Susquehanna, and sections not yet known to be infected, it is probable that it can be arrested or even entirely prevented.

Affected limbs should be cut off well below the dead wood and burned. Any trees, the trunks of which are diseased should be cut down and the bark and branches burned. The wood could be used for any purpose desired; it will not spread the disease.

While the State Forestry Department is personally directing work of this kind it behooves every individual to exert himself immediately, and co-operate for the common good. Within the sections named complete control or destruction of this chestnut disease seem assured if proper effort is made.

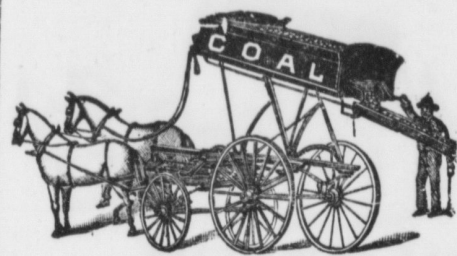
