BARBER'S HEAVY SENTENCE

Pleaded Guilty to Series of Crimes in Wrightsville

James Yellefs, a colored barber, recently located at Wrightsville, formerly of Florin, Monday pleaded guilty to four serious crimes committed in Wrightsville. The crimes to which Yellefs pleaded guilty are as follows: Felonious assault committed upon Joseph S. Wilson on September 15, not less than twenty-one months nor more than seven years; assault with intent to rob George W. Shultz, on September 10, not less than two and one-half years nor more than ten years; this sentence to commence at the expiration of the first robbery committed upon Enos Dietz and Oliver Poff, on July 27, by which \$15 was taken from them, same sentence as in Shultz case, but to run concurrently with it, obtaining \$25 from Helen Taylor by means of threats and blackmail, not less than fifteen months nor more than five years, to run concurrently with the sentence in the Shultz case.

This is an aggregate of not less than twelve years in jail at the least and not more than forty-nine years.
