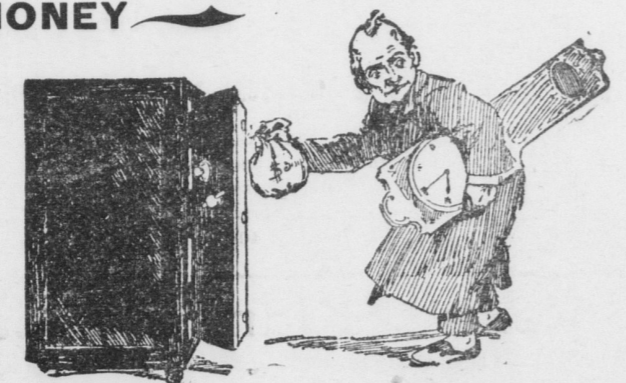

## Farmers' Column

VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR OUR SUBURBAN FRIENDS

The Apple the Most Profitable Fruit. How to Burn up Stumps—Butter Fat Pays in Winter—The use of Chemical Fertilizers—Notes

A simple rule for the arrangement of dooryard trees and shrubs is never to set them in straight lines, but in groups with curvilinear boundaries.

An ideal peach orchard location is a high, rolling elevation where the very best air drainage is obtainable, and if the land slopes toward the northwest so much the better. Never set peach trees in a hollow.

Rough, stormy weather should be utilized in preparing the frames and in replacing broken glass in the hot-bod and cold frame sash. It is desirable to paint sash at least every other year.

Crop rotation will greatly assist you in building up the soil and in providing feed for your animals. You cannot expect that your yield will be satisfactory if you grow the same crop successively a number of years on the same land. Try a rotation in which legumes have a prominent place.

Dust is one of the great road problems. Its presence means wear and tear and disease. Applicants of tar not only keep it down and prevent it, but tar is a disinfectant. It kills the germs, and a tarred road will certainly make for health.

How about building an icehouse now? It will not cost a whole lot of money or time to do it, and the result will add a new comfort and pleasure in farm life as well as a profit making proposition for the care of milk and other perishable farm products.

Do not forget that type is more to be considered in buying dairy cows than breed. There are good animals and poor animals in all breeds, and the number of poor animals available usually predominates. Most poor animals are for sale because the owner does not want them.

There is one thing which all farmers who use chemicals should remember. These conditions should be spread as evenly as possible. They are all concentrated and will burn or injure vegetation if they are dumped in handfuls upon growing crops. They should be spread out all over the ground.

Butter fat is in greatest demand during the winter. The prices are best in winter. The farmer can make the most money by producing it in winter provided he has the right kind of a cow, given the right care and proper feed. Where the most money is made in dairying there you will find a community doing winter dairying.

In the early part of the winter bore a two inch auger hole to a depth of about three inches in the top of each stump to be removed, fill the hole with refined nitrate of potash and drive a pin tight on it. Let it remain until the spring, when the potash will be absorbed. Pour a little oil on the top of the stump and set afire. The entire stump and in a great many instances all the roots will be consumed by a slow burning.

Without doubt the most profitable fruit raised by the American farmer is the apple. Considering the little attention it requires and the general hardness of the fruit trees there is no reason why every farmer should not take a deep interest in their raising, particularly as they are so lavish in their returns.

Apples grow in clay, sand, gravel, shale and in a mixture of all these, provided the soil is deep, well drained and properly supplied with humus and that it is elevated somewhat above the immediately surrounding lands and slightly rolling to admit of air drainage. The matter of altitude, not above the sea level, but above the immediately surrounding lands, is very important. A difference of only twenty feet can produce the difference between a cloudy skin and a clear skin in apples. Loose stones and boulders are no objection. The loose, flat stones found on some of our rough lands serve as a mulch, the very best mulch that we can have. Trees will send their roots down alongside and under the boulders and find moisture there, so that very often the very roughest field on the farm, one that cannot be worked profitably in ordinary farm crops may be the very best orchard site and produce a heavy crop of good apples.

Desires Marriage Annulled. Counsel for Mrs. Emma Bair Long, of New Holland, presented a petition to court on Monday asking for the annulment of her marriage to John J. Long, of Elizabethtown. The ground is that Long was married at the time he made Miss Bair his wife. Long recently pleaded guilty to bigamy and was given a year's imprisonment.

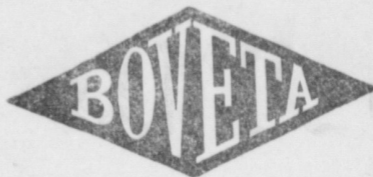

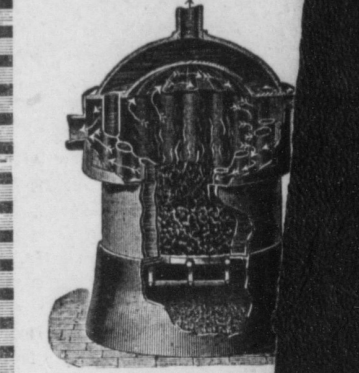
