Asphyxiated

A WELL KNOWN COUPLE MEET DEATH AT READING

Mr. and Mrs. Amos Swarr, of Lancaster, who were raised in the vicinity of Salunga, die from escaping gas in their apartments at Reading, Pa., on Sunday.

Reading, Pa., Jan. 15.—The bodies of Amos Swarr and his wife, Ida Swarr, who had been living in Reading for several months, were found to-day in their apartments at No. 724 Franklin street. Other occupants of the hotel were attracted by the fumes of escaping gas, which was traced to the site of rooms occupied by the Swarrs.

The body of the husband was found in one room and that of his wife in another, after the door had been forced open. Both were attired in their night clothes. The burners of a gas stove used for cooking in a room adjoining the apartments had been partly turned on.

It is supposed that when Swarr reached over the gas stove to get lunch out of a refrigerator he accidentally opened the burners.

Coroner Wagner viewed both bodies and granted a certificate of accidental death.

Who the Couple Were

Swarr would have been thirty-nine years old on Wednesday of this week. His father lives at Salunga, of which place deceased was a native. His mother is dead, but there are surviving brothers and sisters in Salunga and Columbia. Swarr was a line-man and he was in the employ of the Conestoga Traction Company and the Bell Telephone Company in Lancaster. About five months ago Swarr and his wife went to live in Reading where he was employed as a line-man by the United Traction Company.

Before marriage Mrs. Swarr was Ida Catharine Weimer. She was thirty-two years old and was born in Lancaster. Her father, John A. Weimer, who had been janitor at the postoffice died about two years ago. The couple were married about three years ago and they had no children. Beside the mother, Mrs. Mary Weimer, of No. 125 South Christian street, a sister, Mrs. Annie Andre, of Brooklyn, N. Y., survives.

Undertaker Groff of Lancaster received the bodies Monday and prepared them for interment.
