FAIR GROUND IMPROVEMENTS

Arranging in the Winter for the Summer Exhibition

This weather does not look very good for holding fairs, but the gentlemen who conduct the annual county fair in Lancaster are astir at all seasons. They have held several meetings concerning the fair of next fall. The date will be the week of September 25th. While there will be other fairs that same week, the Lancaster people have shown that they are capable of holding a fair on almost any date they see fit and draw a crowd. The attendance last year was very much larger than at the opening, although there were big attractions at Trenton and fairs at Reading and other places. Already the association has arranged for big improvements that will be started as soon as spring opens. The grand stand is to be greatly enlarged and an addition three-fourths as large as the present stand will be made. A new band stand will be made, which will be two stories in height. The lower floor will be used by the musicians, while the upper will be for the newspaper men and officials of the fair. There has always been complaint that too many people crowd the judges' stand and it is not generally known that it is against the rules of the National Trotting association for outsiders to mix with the racing officials. To stop that interference the new stand will be erected. The water supply will be greatly increased by the erection of a stand pipe along the creek and when that is completed there will be no scarcity of water on the grounds. A man will be elected to have entire charge of the grounds and live in the farm house the year around. Many other improvements will be made to the grounds and nothing will be left undone to make it one of the best for fair purposes in the state.

Then he was elected to the school superintendency of Lancaster county, and he has held that position for nine successive terms."
