Obituary Notes Bill Repealing Special Law of 1864 Passed by the Senate THE ROAD WHICH WE ALL MUST

There was a years. general act of the Legislature passed several years ago that made the pay of jurors \$2.50 per day and witnesses \$1.50. Those rates were paid in this county until the question was

raised in the taxation of costs in a civil suit. Counsel interested held that witnesses were entitled to only

\$1 a day, and claimed that the local act of 1864 had not been repealed by the general law making the pay of jurors \$2.50 and witnesses \$1.50. Judge Landis sustained this position

and held that the local law was not repealed. After Judge Landis' opinion was filed the county paid its jurors and witnesses the compensa-

ion named in the special act. The first grand jury that served after the county returned to the low-

er pay, in its report, referred to the inconvenience that jurors were put to for a compensation that did not pay current expenses. The court admitted the pay was too small, but said there was no way to increase it until the Legislature met to repeal the

WOMAN GETS LIFE INSURANCE AND HUSBAND IS ALIVE

Mr. Kennard came to Reading to locate his children. After three visits to the morgue by Mrs. Mina Kennard she declared the body to be that of her husband.

Kennard said he had his life insured for \$480. The company states that \$406 was paid to Mrs. Kennard. He continued: "When I received the special delivery letter from my friend n Coatesville that I had been drowned and my body buried it almost paralyzed me. I thought it was information of the death of my daughter. It took me just an hour to pull together. As soon as I could arrange matters I started for Reading. I intended hunting up my wife." Mrs. C. Kennard, residing in Bainbridge, Lancaster county, sent several communications to Coroner Wagner, this city, in which she claims that she believes the body found in the river was that of her husband. 


