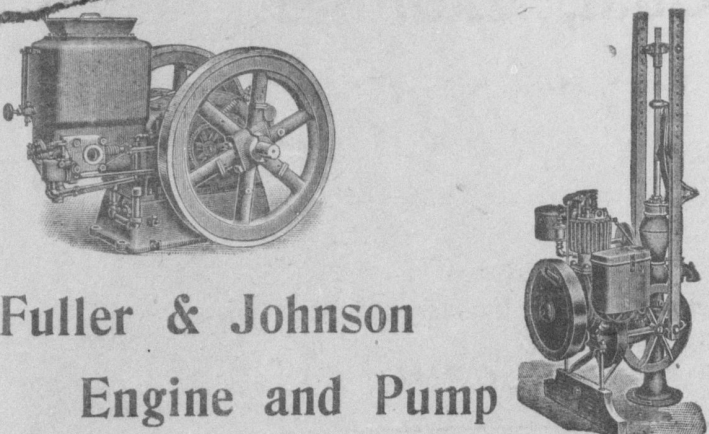

Farmers' Column

VALUABLE INFORMATION FOR OUR SUBURBAN FRIENDS

Preservation of Fence Posts—Roots for Pigs—Novel Method of Preventing Fence Flying—Hardy Parents Beget Hardy Offspring

Selling crops from the farm accounts for decreasing fertility.

If crops are all fed on the farm and other feed is also bought and fed then the land will increase in fertility.

The best way to market corn is to first put it through the silo and then sell it in the shape of fat animals. The most economic way of securing a permanent roadbed is through drainage. It solves much of the good roads problem.

The manure spreader will pay better dividends than any other farm machine that could be purchased by a farmer.

The good value of lime in the soil is its power to correct soil acidity, or sourness, and to improve the texture or physical condition.

Sheep should be turned out every nice day. Lambs should not be allowed to get chilled. Their frail bodies cannot withstand severely cold weather.

When the hogs are watered both the drinking part and the barrel should be kept clean and sweet. A lump of quicklime dropped into the barrel occasionally will keep it pure.

Once farmers were convinced that cattle feeding would pay, they would then commence to improve their breed. There are many good cattle in this country which would never pay any man to feed.

Little pigs may be kept from danger of crusting by the mother when she lies down by having a fender made of a scantling, rail or rope, securely fastened say, eight inches from the wall and the same distance from the floor.

Hardy parents beget hardy offspring. If we neglect in this particular each succeeding generation will be more delicate. No fowl should be used in the breeding pen that had a case of serious illness. No matter how sure we may feel that full health has been restored, there is still some taint of disease remaining in the fowl which will be inherited by the young. Inbreeding has caused more weakened constitutions than anything else we know of.

There is a novel way of preventing fence flying: Take good strong string and tie a knot about three inches from the end nearest the knot and put it around tip end of the wing and tie a slip-knot below the knot in the string, so it cannot pull too tight on the wing. Then pass the other end of the string under the other wing and have it just loose enough so that the chicken can keep its wings folded naturally and tie the same as the other end. After it has been on about six weeks the string may be removed and your chicken will stay in just as though it had never flown over a fence.

Roots have been tied to hogs experimentally by different experiment stations notably by the Utah, Ohio and Indiana stations and also by the central experiments there was quite a percentage gained by the feeding of roots. In compiling some of the feeding trials Professor Henry shows that 615 pounds of roots would save 100 pounds of grain. It must be kept in mind that roots should not be fed in any very large way, for the reason that they produce a watery carcass. Rutabagas or one large mangold a day are plenty of this kind of food. The hog naturally demands a concentrated diet, and of course roots are just the opposite of being concentrates.

Do not take an expensive post and one which is already comparatively durable, such as cedar, to treat with preservatives, but use a cheap kind of wood, such as the willow, cottonwood, box elder, maple, etc. These poorer grades of wood when treated with a preservative are practically as good as the more expensive kinds. Creosote is the preparation most generally used to preserve wood. There are a number of ways of applying it to fenceposts. The cheapest though least effective way is to paint the fenceposts a couple of times with hot creosote in a big open tank and place the fenceposts in it for several hours. No matter what method is used, it is very essential that the posts be thoroughly seasoned before treated. If they contain sap they will not take up the preservative.
